BY-LAWS

WORLD VISION DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION, INC

ARTICLE I Name of Corporation

The name of the corporation shall be WORLD VISION DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION, INC.

ARTICLE II Principal Office of the Corporation

The principal office of the Foundation shall be at 389 Quezon Ave. Cor. West 6th St., West Triangle, Quezon City, Philippines. (As Amended in the Annual General Membership Meeting on February 2, 2016).

ARTICLE III Mission Statement and Core Values

The Mission Statement and Core Values of the Foundation shall be those incorporated in its Articles of Incorporation (*Preamble and Article IV*). These shall govern all aspects of the operations of the Foundation. They shall not be removed or deleted from the By-Laws or the Articles of Incorporation without the 2/3 vote of all officers and members of the Foundation.

ARTICLE IV Membership

- Sec. 1. The members of the organization shall be individuals composed of its incorporators and those included in the attached list submitted to the SEC together with these By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation.
- Sec. 2. Additional members may be admitted to the Foundation only upon invitation and approval of the majority of the Board of Trustees. The list of additional members will be submitted to the SEC from time to time.
- Sec. 3. Term of Members. Members who are accepted and remain in good standing shall retain their membership for as long as they are willing to serve and attest to their commitment every year. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)
- Sec. 4. **Criteria for Members of the Foundation.** Any member of the Foundation shall meet the following minimum criteria:
 - 4a. Must be Christian; will affirm and sign the Statement of Faith of World Vision.
 - 4b. Good reputation in the country for character and competence.

- 4c. Agrees to accept the responsibilities of a member of the Foundation as set out in this By-Laws; can commit his/her time, energy and talents to the discharge of these responsibilities.
- 4d. Contribute, participate and actively share his/her talents and resources (financial and otherwise) to promote the ministry for World Vision and obtain resources for the Foundation.
- Sec. 5. **Responsibilities of Members.** Members of the Board shall have the following roles and responsibilities:
 - 5a. Understand, accept and commit to the ministry, objective and purposes of World Vision and support it in its undertakings.
 - Promote and represent the Foundation to the public in every way possible.
 - Use their God-given talents, spiritual gifts and skills in discharging their duties as members of the Foundation.
 - 5d. Participate in the deliberations and meetings of the Foundation: and vote on matters pertaining to its operations.
 - 5e. Elect the members of the Board of Trustees.
 - 5f. During the annual membership meeting, appoint the external auditor of the Foundation.
- Sec. 6. **Disqualifications for Members**. Members may be disqualified from their membership in the Foundation for the following reasons:
 - 6a. Has disqualifications <u>as set forth in the Revised Corporation Code or R.A.</u> <u>No. 11232</u>; (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)
 - 6b. Failure to comply with the minimum criteria for membership as enumerated in Art. IV, Sec. 4 of these By-Laws as well as the responsibilities of members in Art. IV, Sec 5 of the same By-Laws;
 - 6c. Failure to attend three (3) consecutive membership meetings without any justifiable reason.
- Sec.7. Removal of Members. Any member of the Foundation may be removed based on the disqualifications as set forth in the preceding Section by a vote of the majority of the voting members in a regular or special meeting called for that purpose. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

ARTICLE V Membership Meetings

Sec. 1 Annual Meeting. The regular annual meeting of the members shall be held on the first Tuesday of February of every year at the place to be designated by the Board. (As amended on January 28, 2014)

Notice of meeting shall be sent in writing to each member a week before, stating the date, time and place of the meeting and the agenda or business to be taken up.

- Sec. 2 Special Meetings. Special meetings of the members may be held anytime to take up urgent matters needing action. Such meetings may be called upon the request of the Executive Directors or by the Chairman or by the majority vote of the members.
- Sec. 3 **Quorum and Proxies.** The majority of the members, whether present or duly represented by proxy, shall constitute a quorum to transact business. Each member shall be entitled to one (1) vote only.

Members can be represented by proxy upon presentation to the Chairman of written authorization including <u>electronic mail subject to positive identification</u> and verification, and given to the Secretary for inspection and record prior to the opening of the meeting. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

- Sec. 4 Members who cannot physically attend or vote at annual meetings for justifiable reasons can participate and vote through remote communication such as videoconferencing, teleconferencing, virtual online conference or other alternative modes of communication as allowed by law. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)
 - Sec. 5. Rules of Order. Rules governing the conduct of all meetings of the Foundation shall be agreed upon beforehand by majority vote of the members, aimed at the maintenance and order of the facilitation of the resolution of the business on hand.
- Sec. 6 The minutes of the meeting shall be recorded and kept by the Secretary at the principal office of the Foundation.

ARTICLE VI The Board of Trustees

Sec. 1 Composition and Number.

The general oversight and the supervision of the entire work of the Foundation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees, composed of <u>fourteen (14)</u> members, a majority of whom shall be Filipino citizens. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Two (2) of the members of the Board of Trustees shall serve as ex-officio members. They are the Executive Director and one to be designated by World Vision International. They are automatically members of the Foundation. However, the Executive Director shall have no voting right. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Sec. 2 Qualifications.

Only members of the Foundation may be elected as members of the Board of Trustees at anytime. They shall also fulfill other requirements that may be agreed upon by the majority of the members of the Foundation.

The criteria for any member of the Board of Trustees shall be the following:

- Must be Christian; will affirm and sign the Statement of Faith of World Vision.
- 2b. Good reputation in the country for character and competence.
- 2c. Agrees to accept the responsibilities of a member of the Foundation as set out in this By-Laws; can commit his/her time, energy and talents to the discharge of these responsibilities.
- 2d. Contribute, participate and actively share his/her talents and resources (financial and otherwise) to promote the ministry for World Vision and obtain resources for this.
- Does not have any undue conflict of interest under the Conflict of Interest Policy.

Sec. 3 Roles and Responsibilities of the Board of Trustees.

- 3a. Set policies and directions to harmonize and coordinate the ministry of World Vision in the Philippines.
- 3b. Act as the custodian of the Vision, Mission and Core Values of World Vision, ensuring that its operations conform to the tenets of World Vision in pursuit of transformational development.
- 3c. Ensure Foundation's continuing operations and sustainability.
- 3d. Approve budgets and set policies on the stewardship of assets of the Foundation.
- 3e. In consultation with World Vision International, appoint the Executive Director of the Foundation and approve the appointment of Senior staff as recommended by the Executive Director
- 3f. Approve applications for membership in the Foundation.
- 3g. Serve as the guide, counselor and prayer support to the Executive Director and the whole leadership team, assisting them to achieve their best in the management of the ministry and operations of the Foundation.

Sec. 4 Election and Term of Office.

The members of the duly constituted Board of Trustees shall elect from among themselves a Chairperson, a Vice Chairperson, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

As soon as organized, the Trustees shall so classify themselves so that the term of office of one third (1/3) of their number shall expire every year, and subsequent elections of Trustees comprising one third (1/3) of the Board of Trustees shall be held annually thereafter and Trustees so elected shall have a term of three (3) years. (As amended on 19 March 2002)

The term of office of each Trustee shall be three (3) years and shall not exceed more than-three (3) consecutive terms. A Trustee who has served three (3) consecutive terms may be considered for nomination after a break of one (1) year in service. The Trustee may, however, serve the Foundation in a different

capacity as may be appropriate. The restrictions in the term of office will not apply to the ex-officio members. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

At all elections of Trustees, there must be present, either in person or through a representative authorized to act by written proxy, a majority of the members entitled to vote. The members may also vote through virtual communication or other modes of communication as allowed by law. A member who participates through virtual communication or other modes of communication shall be deemed present for purposes of quorum. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

The election must be by ballot if requested by any voting member. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Sec. 5 Quorum.

A majority of authorized number of Trustees shall constitute a quorum of the board for the transaction of business. Every decision by a majority of the quorum duly assembled, as a Board, shall be valid as a corporate act.

A Trustee who participates through virtual communication or other alternative communications as allowed by law, shall be deemed present for purposes of quorum and for the transaction of business. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Sec. 6 Enactment of Policies.

All policies that may be enacted by the Board or the members of the Foundation shall conform to and be in accordance with the principles, spirit and framework of the World Vision International Covenant of Partnership.

Sec. 7 Compensation.

Trustees shall not receive any compensation for their services to the Foundation.

Sec. 8 Vacancies in the Board.

Vacancies in the Board of Trustees arising from resignation or any other valid reasons except removal or expiration of term will be filled up immediately by a majority vote of the Trustees representing a quorum. The replacement shall serve for the remaining unexpired term.

A Trustee may resign at anytime, provided notice in writing has been served to the Chairperson. This shall take effect upon receipt of the Foundation of said letter of resignation unless a specific date has been fixed in the letter.

A Trustee may be removed from office with cause by a vote of at least twothirds (2/3) of the membership of the Foundation in a meeting duly called for that purpose.

ARTICLE VII Corporate Officers

Sec. 1 Officers.

The officers of the Foundation shall consist of a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer. The Foundation shall have such other officers as its business may require.

The Executive Director shall serve as ex-officio, non-voting member of the Board of Trustees.

The Secretary shall be a resident and citizen of the Philippines. <u>An Assistant to the Secretary may be appointed by the Board who may not be a member of the Board of Trustees.</u> In the event the assistant is not a member of the Board of <u>Trustees</u>, the assistant must come from the Senior Management preferably the incumbent Legal Counsel. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Sec. 2 Election and Term of Officers.

The officers of the Foundation – the Chairperson, the Vice Chairperson, the Secretary and the Treasurer – shall be elected by the members of the Board of Trustees from among themselves. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

The term of office of the aforementioned officers of the Foundation shall be one year.

Sec. 3 Chairperson.

The Chairperson shall initiate the calling of all meetings of the Board and the membership of the Foundation and preside in them. <u>The Chairperson</u> shall provide leadership over the other officers in order to facilitate decisions and other business of the Foundation. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Moreover, the Chairperson will be a spiritual leader to the officers of the Foundation, ensuring that their decisions are in accordance with the vision of the Foundation as inscribed in the Articles of Incorporation and Article III of this By-Laws and its Core Values. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Sec. 4 Executive Director

The Executive Director shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees in consultation with World Vision International.

The <u>Executive Director</u> shall see to it that the Foundation adheres and carries out the corporate Mission Statement and Core Values. <u>The Director</u> shall provide actual supervision, management responsibility and accountability over the Foundation. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

The <u>Executive Director</u> shall implement the policies and decisions of the Board of Trustees. The said officer shall execute contracts and agreements authorized by the Board of Trustees on behalf of the Foundation. He/she shall be responsible for ensuring the quality of performance of all employees and agents of the organization; and provide the needed leadership necessary to run the organization. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Sec. 5 Vice Chairperson

The Vice Chairperson shall discharge the responsibilities of the Chairperson in his/her absence or incapacity and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board.

Sec 6 Secretary

The Secretary shall record all the proceedings of the Board and membership meetings; keep such records in <u>the officer's</u> custody; prepare all reportorial requirements in compliance with government regulations as well as those that may be required by World Vision International. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

Sec. 7 Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be in charge of all the funds, receipts and disbursements of the Foundation. <u>Said officer</u> shall see to it that the funds are disbursed in a manner consistent with the guidelines established by the Foundation and other pertinent financial policies and procedures of World Vision International. <u>The Treasurer</u> shall render an annual statement showing the financial standing of the Foundation at the end of the fiscal year and such other financial reports as may be required. (As Amended in a Special General Membership Meeting on October 13, 2020)

ARTICLE VIII Fiscal Year and Other Provisions

Sec. 1 Fiscal Year.

The fiscal year of the organization shall begin on the first (1st) day of October and shall end on the last day of September of the following year.

Sec. 2 Corporate Seal.

The seal of the Foundation shall be the logo of World Vision International.

Sec. 3 Use and Disposition of Assets.

Consistent with its nature as a non-stock, non-profit organization that obtains its funds from the goodwill and generosity of individual and corporate sponsors and donors here and abroad, the foundation is a steward of all the benefits and assets resulting from such goodwill and generosity. Therefore, no part of its income or assets shall inure to the individual benefit of any of its members at any time of its existence. Upon its dissolution, after payment of or provision for the payment of all debts and liabilities of the Foundation, its assets shall be distributed to other World Vision affiliates and beneficiaries in the country or other Christian organizations whose ministries are consistent with its own.

ARTICLE IX Amendments

Sec. 1. Unless otherwise provided by law, no amendment, modification, alteration of this By-Laws shall be made without the approval of the majority vote of the Board and the members of the Foundation in a regular or special meeting called for this purpose. (As amended on 19 March 2002)

- To change the number of Trustees from 15 members to 14 members and clarify the roles of ex-officio members on Section 1 of Article V, page 4:
- To clarify the term of Trustees and provide for alternative modes to participate in the election of Trustees in Section 4 of Article VI, page 6;
- To provide for alternative mode of participation in Board Meetings and determination of quorum in Section 5 of Article VI, page 6;
- To provide for the Assistant Corporate Secretary under Section 1, Article VII, page 7; and
- To harmonize the sentences in Section 2, 3, 4, 6, and 7 of Article VII, pages 8 to 9.

I. CALL TO ORDER

Vice-Chairperson, Mr. Eduardo Jimenez called the meeting to order at 2:20 in the morning.

II. OPENING PRAYER AND BIBLICAL REFLECTION

The opening prayer and Biblical reflection was led by Dr. Maria Jasmin Jamora. She read from Philippians 4:4-9 and gave a reflection on the theme "Fit to Follow Jesus, Walking the Walk".

III. CERTIFICATION OF NOTICE/QUORUM

Corporate Secretary Ms. Bettina Salmo certified that all the members of the Board of Trustees were duly notified and that a quorum existed. Apologies from Trustees unable to attend were noted.

IV. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

The Board approved the agenda as presented and circulated to all Board members together with the notice of meeting.

V. READING AND APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE REGULAR BOARD MEETING HELD ON April 12, 2022

The Board Members reviewed the minutes of the previous meeting held last April 12, 2022. UPON MOTION MADE AND SECONDED, the Board approved with the suggested changes in the minutes of the previous regular meeting held on April 12, 2022.

VI. MATTERS ARISING FROM THE PREVIOUS MEETING

Atty. Abot informed the Board that there were matters arising from the previous meeting, which were as follows:

a. Board Term Limits and Re-election.

VII. BOARD BUSINESS

1. Organizational Update

Atty. Abot informed the Board that the organizational update will be reported by Mr. Rommel V. Fuerte. He informed the Trustees that overall the organization is on track with respect to its targets and that the management is confident to accomplish all the remaining activities for FY 2022. He showed a video of the accomplishment highlights of the organization. Mr. Fuerte highlighted the expanding partnership with KOICA.

After the video presentation, Dr. Jamora inquired with Mr. Fuerte why there were some items in the organizational update that was in red. Mr. Fuerte replied that it is in red because the data is not yet updated as it was in the process of validation. He did not want to report figures to the Board that was not verified.

Mr. Jimenez then commented that he was able to gather from the presentation that we should listen more and asked for clarification regarding this and the Marawi project that was shown in the video. He also suggested the Trustees be given shirts or vest when they are going to the field as the WVI is doing this to its members. Mr. Fuerte explained that we need to listen more because of the impact of COVI-19 pandemic and the nee normal of doing things. He also informed the Board that the Marawi project will continue which is part of the on-going partnership wit KOICA and our efforts to increase our impact in fragile context. On the shirts or vest, Mr. Fuerte informed that Board that the organization will be providing vests instead of shirts as this can be worn with any clothe inside.

Dr. Violeta Bautista then inquired about the emergency response provided by the organization and some highlights and distinct accomplishments that can be shared with their colleagues in other fields.

Mr. Fuerte informed the Board that World Vision has always been first on site in disasters and emergency response as a result we have been included in the UN Central Emergency Response Fund as a major implementing agency in certain areas for disasters such as typhoons because we can deliver and one of the fastest on the ground.

The organization also has been implementing in its distribution of Non-food items which are child focus in presentable boxes which even DSWD has copied. We also implement Protection against Sexual Exploitation and Abuse which is integrated in the emergency response.

Mr. Jimenez commented that World Vision has been uniquely positioned because of its efforts on child protection which has been recognized by UN and World Bank. Ms. Veronica Jimenez also commented that she is proud of the organization for the only one implementing the spiritual nurture of the children and that it has not been hindered by lack of funds as has been the excuse of the government in implementing projects. Ms, Jimenez, however, asked if in the implementation of the WV projects particularly in education what were integrated for the learning for the learning of the children.

Mr. Fuerte replied that WV has implementing its program in partnership with DepEd to capacitate the teachers. WV provides feedback and tools to the teachers to teach the learners but the organization has no capacity to provide instruction to learners. One of the strategies that WV is doing is the peer to peer program which allows older students to teach younger ones.

Ms. Bettina Salmo commented and gave a suggestion to keep the Board updated so that they can discuss and talk about it to others in their respective circles. She suggested that the updates be kept short so it would be easily used for discussion.

Mr. Fuerte appreciated the suggestion of Ms. Salmo and informed that Board that they will be providing some workshops in the future to utilize the potential of the Board Members as ambassadors.

2. Ministry Quality Report

WVDF Country Strategy Midterm Review

Atty. Abot introduced Ms. Vanessa Retuerma to report on the results of the Country Strategy Midterm Review. Ms. Retuerma started with the objectives of the country strategy review which were as follows:

- Review WVDF's organizational performance progress for the past two and half years vis-à-vis it FY20-24 Country Strategy (i.e., strategic objectives, strategic initiatives and targets);
- Assess the various trends emerging in the external context, including WV Partnership-level initiatives and its implications on WVDF's FY20-24 Country Strategy; and
- Identify necessary adjustments that need to be done in the WVDF Country Strategy for FY23-24, and to ensure its relevance and agility with respect to the changes in the current operating context.

Ms. Retuerma explained the reasons behind the objectives and then proceeded to discuss the process conducted for the review. She informed the Trustees that internal and external assessments were made prior to the holding of a workshop where all departments were represented. After which the results of the workshop were deliberated upon by the Senior Leadership Team.

Among the issues identified during the assessment the following were deliberated by the participants in the workshop:

- Climate Change Adaptation/ Environmental Stewardship (CCA/ES)
- Gender Equality & Social Inclusion (GESI)
- Urban Programming

- Fragile Context Programming
- CEVI Transition
- Marketing & Branding

The results of the review were made into recommendations and some action points which are as follows:

Ms, Salmo inquired about how will management deal with the topic on GESI since there is a new convention in defining gender which is beyond being male or female. Mr. Fuerte replied that the topic will be an interesting conversation which will be held at all levels including at the Partnership level. However, he explained that the Philippine context will be prioritized and with this he mentioned that the some of the Board Members especially in the committee level would like to be involved in said discussion. Dr. Violeta Bautista commented that the discussion on this topic is important as it is part of a person's well-being.

Mr. Simoun Ung told the Board and management to be careful in dealing with the issue on gender as there is a difference between the legal and the Christina definition of gender. He narrated about a situation

in one of his organization Wycliffe Associates, Inc. where an individual belonging to the LBTGQ community was hired but who did not disclose such fact to the organization and further tried together with his same sex partner to be included in the medical insurance plan of Wycliffe. Said individual was fired but filed a complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. He then requested Mr. Jimenez to clarify on the stand of the partnership regarding this.

Mr. Jimenez commented that the WVUS in particular has been cautious about making a stand on this issue especially on what happened years ago. The Philippines has a different context that other countries but we still need to be careful regarding this topic.

Ms. Salmo asked about how the organization defines high net worth individuals. Mr. Fuerte a HNWI is defined by the criteria on wealth x data research. Ms. Salmo then asked on what we do to HNWI who are not active. Mr. Fuerte then answered that the organization will prioritize engaging those that are active. Then we get them together such as in the Circle of Friends and see what we can achieve in that group. Mr. Fuerte informed the Board that so far the Circle of Friends is doing well since one of the major HNWI has committed themselves with a certain amount of money.

Operational Excellence

Ms. Retuerma informed the Board that there is a proposed amendment in the Strategic Objective on Operational Excellence No. 3 with the insertion of the word agility in the statement. Mr. Jimenez then asked the Board Members if they have any comments on the proposed insertion of the word agility. There being none, Mr. Simoun Ung moved to approve the insertion of the word "agility" in OE3.

Upon motion seconded the insertion of the word "agility" in OE3 of the Country Strategy has been approved.

Amendment of Safeguarding Policy

Atty. Abot informed the Board that the next presentation for Ministry Quality would be the proposed amendment to the Child and Adult Safeguarding Policy. He gave a background on the creation of the said policy reminded the Board that it was sent previously through email. He then proceeded to present the revised Child and Adult Safeguarding Policy which was approved and endorsed by the Committee on Ministry Quality for the Board's approval.

Upon motion seconded the Board approved the proposed amendments to the Child and Adult Safeguarding Policy.

3. Board Development and Governance Report

Atty. Abot presented on the next item in the agenda which was about the Board Term Limits and the Re-election of the Trustees in the last elections. He informed that Board that the Partnership Governance is calling the attention of the WV Philippines in its compliance with National Board's Policy particularly on the re-election of Trustees under exceptional circumstances after their term has finished. According to the provision under the last paragraph of 2.4.A of Appendix 2 of the NBP, which states as follows:

"The maximum length of service for a board or advisory council member shall be nine years, except if a member is a member of the WVI Board (and continued membership on the WVI board is consistent with the WVI board's own membership criteria), under exceptional circumstances with the approval of the WVI Board or WVI Board Committee, or as set forth in section 2.4B."

There was concern that WV Philippines has not complied with the above provision by not seeking approval of the WVI Board for three (3) Trustees that were re-elected in the last election. Regional Governance Advisor Reginald Tiu gave clarification regarding the provision and appealed the case with the Partnership Governance. He informed that the Board that the Partnership Governance has considered the situation and proposed a solution in moving forward. He stated that the re-elected Trustees can continue with their current term for three years until 2025 and will not be eligible for re-election.

Discussions and arguments were made by the Board Members regarding the provision and a suggestion was even made to remove the criteria "under exceptional circumstances". After discussion, there being no resolution agreed upon, Mr. Jimenez requested for the sake of time to refer the disposition of the proposal by the Partnership Governance to the Committee of Board Development and Governance.

4. Finance and Resources Development Report

Ms. Zuzee Acedera, Finance Director presented the FY2023 proposed budget for the Board's approval. Ms. Acedera gave a background of the Finance as of June 30, 2022. She informed that Board that the organization reached \$18.8M in cash project budget commitments for the year out of the original target of \$15.9M. This is primarily due to new grants to support both regular \$7M and emergency programs related programs \$2.7M.

She reported that of the FY2022 NO budget of 16.9 M, total cash project budget was \$15.9M with admin ratio of 11%. Already have \$11.6M secured funding from newly approved proposals and ongoing projects while \$4.3M is still to be raised by local resource team, GAM & HEA. Majority of cash income target is still sponsorship at 56%, followed by Grants at 24%, then PNS at 20%. In terms of sector, projects related to education is on top which is at 48% of total cash target

For FY2023 the proposed budget is 20M. Management will target a flat projection of \$18.9M in cash projects budgets and \$1.1M in Fundraising Cost or a total of \$20M in total National office budget. Out of which, 69% will be coming from international sources and 31% from locally raised funds. Of the 18.9M Cash Project budget, 66% or 12.5M are already secured funding from ongoing and newly approved projects while \$2.6M will be coming from our local fundraising and \$3.8M remains to be raised from Grants acquisition and Humanitarian Emergency Projects.

Cash project allocation is at 50% Sponsorship and the rest of the 50% to grants and private non-sponsorship projects. 56% of Cash projects is for education TP, 20% on CESP, 16% on health and nutrition, 8% on DRR, Fragile context and other new CCA related programs. NO includes DRR/EMR/FC/CCA

The organization will be maintaining flat income levels both in sponsorship and non-sponsorship/ grants projects. She noted that secured funding from local and international grants is at \$5.4M and remaining to be raised is at \$4M. Flat income levels for both international and local income sources will also be maintained. Included in the target for locally raised funds is \$1.7M yet to be raised from local grants and PNS while there is \$\$2.3M yet to be raised from international grants based on identified opportunities in the grant pipeline. PHLO – 4.3M excluding AP allocation to emergency response (1.2M)

There will be a reduction in support cost budget rate from 11% in FY22 to 10% in FY23 to align with the global target of 10%. In terms of amount, the SC budget increased from \$2.39M to to \$2.8M . Out of which, \$2M is already secured funding while the remaining \$8M will be coming from funds yet to be raised from both grants and local fundraising. Utilization of Support cost budgets will be based on secured and available support cost budgets from the projects. 62k admin; \$203k total, 127k difference.

Action points for management will be to Maintain current local RC levels and Increase total income from P245M projected in FY22 to P286M in FY23. This will be coming from increased sponsorship income from new acquisition and strengthened retention efforts through Accel Fund/ Strengthen Revenue investment expected at \$600k in FY21

Projecting an increase in unrestricted and restricted funding coming from increased appeals from Corporate proposals and from cash grants from High Net Worth Individuals: In the bag cash grants at P33M or \$661k while to be raised amount is at P15.2M or \$299k. Accel fund grant expected at \$625k in FY23 to boost sponsorship and digital fundraising platforms. Commitment to projects will be based on Peso values due to forex trends.

For FY2023 budget, WVDF will initially be working with the 80:20 Programs to fundraising cost ratio requirement subject for review and alignment to new DSWD requirement of 95:5 (95% Programs, 5% Fundraising)

Top channels for FY23 are online- via email and website, next is corporate then tele and face to face. In terms of campaigns, most of our local income will still be coming from the recurring pledges, Corporate Grants, Major Gift campaigns and appeals to corporate grants. Reasons, 1000 girls campaign, First Time in a long time as well as back to school campaigns remain to be top. Key retention initiatives that we have includes scaling up of our minimum sponsors Experience Standards, Project Salute, Loyal Donor Appreciation and Donor café engagements. There will be an intention to sustain strategic networks and partnering initiatives which includes Child Amabassador program, Volunteer events, Lakbay Pag-asa, Circle of Friends, F2F meetings, Major gift collaterals, Brand campaigns, PR Seeding. Media Events as well as Digital Media Boost.

There is also a grant pipeline projecting \$4M out of the \$8.3M total expected proposal value. This does not include any projection for emergency response.

After the presentation of Ms. Acedera, Mr. Jimenez called on the Board for comments or questions. Mr. Mr. Jorge Marquez clarified with management if the figures in the presentation were the same as those sent in the email. Mr. Fuerte replied and informed the Board that there were some adjustments made particularly on the admin ratio. He apologized for the delayed submission of the budget proposal and explained that there were some processes needed to go through before the budget can be approve for presentation to the Board. This includes consultation to the Regional Office.

Ms. Jimenez asked about the impact of the Philippine Peso depreciation if it would have an impact on the budget. Mr. Fuerte informed the Board that there is already a Global Guidance regarding foreign exchange rates. Mr. Cherian Thomas further clarified that since the budget was made in peso there would be no impact in the fluctuation of foreign currency exchange rate. After the comments, were completed, Mr. Jimenez asked the Board for any motion regarding the proposed FY2023 Budget.

Upon motion by Mr. Sergio Edeza and seconded by MR. Ung, the FY2023 Proposed NO Budget as presented has been approved.

5. Audit Committee Updates

The Audit Committee report was presented by Ms. Rhona Serapion-Tandog. She informed the Board that here will be no item for approval by the Board since the FY2023 Audit Plan has already been approved in the last Board Meeting. She informed them that she will be giving updates on the implementation of FY2022 Audit Plan and other Updates as follows:

For FY2022, only 2 final audit report was issued, both resulted in ACCEPTABLE overall audit opinion and no reportable issues noted (only minor audit recommendations). Thus, no open audit recommendation to follow-up; all the previous ones were closed already. For FY2023 the approved Audit Plan revision are as follows:

For FY 2022, the actual cost data is only as at May 2022, as per available from Finance. For FY 2023, an increase of 17% in budget (from \$57,111 to \$66,876) for the 2 RBIAs, 1 Thematic, & the follow-up of Saepium Report, covering total of 9 core areas.

On other updates, AP RIAT will remain this structure despite the change in the East Asia and South Asia Pacific structures. FY 2023 audits will have fieldwork visits (local travels), if possible, following the travel restrictions in country and/or province selected.

Mr. Ung commended the performance of management for closing all the issues and doing a good job.

6. Partnership Updates

Mr. Cherian Thomas started his report by commending the WV National Office in quickly resolving all audit issues in record time. The quick turn around for management was impressive which makes the work for the Region easier. This is also true with the other national offices. In response to the question about funding commitment, Mr. Thomas assured the Board that the Partnership has been committed despite the global crisis of the COVID-19 pandemic. He mentioned that there was even in increase in revenue throughout the Partnership. Although, sponsorship revenue experienced a decline, the other sources such as grants and non-sponsorship funding had a significant increase thus filling up the gap. Mr. Thomas is optimistic that in the coming months funding will come since the Region is fairly doing well.

Mr. Thomas informed the Board of the upcoming Triennial Council which will be held on November 13-14 in Accra, Ghana which will be a hybrid meeting. There will be a large contingent of face to face participants but a virtual meeting will also be conducted. He also informed the Board that a National Directors meeting for the region was conducted last July 4 to 8. One significant news discussed in the meeting was the vacancy of WV Nepal. There was also a meeting of the Boards of Asia I which was also concluded well. Mr. Thomas informed the Board about the current structure of the Region which is composed of the East and South Asia Regions. There will be a move to separate these two regions again as was previously the set up. They are targeting to have this done by Oct. 1, 2022. Mr. Thomas further provided the events that will lead or participated by the Region which includes a gathering of NGOS against child labor.

Covid-19 caused tremendous disruption and transformation: More work from home (WFH), More work from untrusted environments, More leverage cloud services for digital transformation, Beware of "shared responsibility model" of cloud services, Growing digital supply chain cyber risk, Smartphone (BYOD) as endpoints to WFH, More working outside of "traditional security perimeter", More sensitive data outside "the office"

Mr. Esmilla informed the Board that currently the main focus of the WVI Global Cybersecurity is the external scanning and assessment. Currently, WVI is not involved in internal scanning. Mr. Esmilla appreciated the efforts of WV Philippines in taking this initiative. He also informed the Board that unfortunately the WVI has no data protection head.

Mr. Ung suggested and asked Mr. Esmilla and his team to inform and update the Board about any breaches or issues regarding data privacy.

Special Board Meeting for CEVI/VFI

Mr. Fuerte informed the Board that a special board meeting may be called to discuss the direction of CEVI and VFI tentatively after the Triennial Council.

Board Development Session

Mr. Fuerte next informed the Board that there will be a Board Development Session in August 2022.

VIII. CLOSING AND ADJOURNMENT

There being no further matters to act on, the Vice-Chairperson Eduardo Jimenez thanked everyone and adjourned the meeting at around 5:00 in the afternoon.

Paying it forward

In 1998, Diana and her three older sisters were chosen to be part of World Vision's Child Sponsorship program. Today, Diana holds a supervisory position in a technology company.

Diana's sponsor always told her how blessed they were to have an avenue to help children. Diana fondly chuckles at the memory. "It was I who was really blessed to have them as my sponsors. I started to dream of becoming a sponsor myself. I told myself that someday, it would be me who would write these kinds of letters to my sponsored child," she shares.

"For me, having the ability to help others is the greatest achievement anyone can ever have," Diana says, admitting that she actively encourages her friends to sponsor children through World Vision. "Even if you don't have much in life, you'll have so much fulfillment when you help others even in the littlest way."



JUSTICE

Breaking gender stereotypes

Feli was hesitant when she was invited to sign up for a scholarship to a two-year auto-mechanic course offered by World Vision, Isuzu, and TESDA. Joining meant being away from her family and entering the male-dominated world of automobiles and machine repair. Regardless, she signed up because of the promise of education and job security.

"I believe that if someone really wants to learn, no one can stop them," Feli says. Throughout the course, Feli read books and modules about automotives and studied hard to pass written and practical exams. Her efforts were rewarded when she graduated as valedictorian. "I achieved this award and proved to myself that I can do it."

The Auto Mechanic Training Centre is a tripartite partnership between Isuzu, TESDA, and World Vision. It aims to provide trainees with the technical skills they need to become globally competitive automotive technicians and by supporting them in non-technical programs, such as values education, leadership skills, and rights awareness.

HEALTH AND NUTRITION

Increase children 0-5 years old who are well-nourished



Lack of access to good health and nutrition keeps children from attending school and participating in their communities. It also makes them vulnerable to illnesses, stunting, and even death. World Vision improves health and nutrition among children and their families by promoting long-term behavioral changes in families with underweight children, teaching practical and holistic early child development practices to parents and caregivers, and providing accessible sanitation facilities in schools and communities.



HOPE A healthier future

Beverly admits that she was too focused on finding ways to survive the pandemic that she forgot the little details that would make her children healthy and fortified.

"I raised my second child without the proper knowledge about infant health care, most especially about proper breastfeeding. I stopped giving him breastmilk when he turned two months old. I did observe that he was sickly and thin," she shares.

Through World Vision's Urban Development Project, Beverly learned how to prepare nutritious meals using accessible ingredients. More importantly, she learned the value of breastfeeding.

"I will correct the mistakes that I made before. I will ensure that my third child is breastfed until she needs it. I know that this is good for her health and nutrition," shares Beverly.



JOY Earl learns how to love his greens

Earl's nutrition was affected when his father lost his job because of the pandemic. Without their main source of income, Earl's family had to ration their food.

Due to his weight, Earl was invited to be part of World Vision's Urban Nutrition Hub, a systemized nutritional feeding activity that provides nutritious meals for undernourished children, health and nutrition lessons to parents or guardians, and vegetable gardening kits and sacks of rice.

"Kaon ko green, Mama (I would like to eat vegetables, mother)," is now Earl's common expression at home according to his mother Mirafel.

"My son learned to love eating vegetables. They served him various meals including soup, porridge mixed with vegetables, and meat viands," Mirafel adds,



JUSTICE Raising children well

When one of her children needed medical treatment due to malnutrition, Mia was introduced to World Vision's Go Baby Go, a program that teaches parents and caregivers age-appropriate nurturing care for children under the age of three.

Mia joined Go Baby Go and was one of the active participants. "My perspective on motherhood changed. I applied all the techniques and proper ways of caring for a child," she says.

Aside from Go Baby Go, Mia also attended Childhood Rescue Project's child protection training where she learned about children's rights, positive dsicipline, and proper parenting. Childhood Rescue Project is World Vision's intervention promoting and advocating for child protection and participation in the cities of Marawi and Cotabato.

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

Every child has the right to drink and use clean and safe water. World Vision partners with communities and donors to encourage positive knowledge, attitudes and practices towards water, sanitation, and hygiene. We also make clean and safe water accessible to more children and their families by improving functional water facilities in communities.



HOPE An improved learning environment

The partnership between the Korean International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) and World Vision has resulted to the renovation of classrooms and construction of communal comfort rooms in Samar.

"We are happy that we are able to deliver the construction and renovation of comfort rooms successfully. Construction is only the first step of achieving the goal but sustaining it is another thing. We can only sustain these projects if we work together along with the schools and students in maintaining and keeping the facilities clean," said Ping Sacala, World Vision Program Manager of the Safe Schools Program.

The construction and renovation are part of the Safe Schools project funded by KOICA and implemented by World Vision. The project aims to improve learning environments in both face-to-face and distance modalities. This can be done by providing safe and quality WASH facilities and distance learning materials.



OY Better schools

"Please wait here. I'll just drink water," James says before hurrying off to a nearby water station. James and his friend Kristine study in a World Vision partner school in Batangas. The partnership ensures that the students have a conducive place to study and play.

"That's from World Vision. It's the only water source where we can drink safely," Kristine says, referring to a water system with a big blue container on top.

The water system, a project between World Vision and Planet Water, is an additional water facility to the school. Its water can be used for washing hands and drinking because it contains a water filtration solution that removes bacteria and viruses that ensures the water is safe.



JUSTICE A luxury no more

For Krisha and the rest of the families in her village, getting safe drinking water is a luxury.

"My father said the only way we can get potable water is to spend almost an entire day and at least Php1,500 for pump boat fuel just to access it in the town proper. That does not include the extra amount to buy a week's supply of purified drinking water," Krisha explains.

This was until World Vision introduced its Clean Water Project in the marshland areas of Agusan Del Sur. In collaboration with rural health units, the project aims to reduce water borne diseases and provide access to safe drinking water through advocacy, capacity building, education on hygiene practices and the use of water purifiers, and provision of water packets.

"The program of World Vision in our community is really the answer to our long plea to access safe water. Although our main source is still in the center of the lake, I am assured that we are drinking treated safe water. I am not worried anymore."

FAITH AND DEVELOPMENT

Increase children who have positive and peaceful relationship with their families and communities

It is necessary for children to grow up in loving families and peaceful and safe environments. This is why as a Christian organization, we encourage values-based, positive, and responsible parenting that allows families to develop spiritually and socio-emotionally. We also involve children and youth in peacebuilding and child protection efforts so that they become active and empowered contributors in their communities.



HOPE A powerful impact

After attending World Vision's spiritual nurture workshops, Jay volunteered to be a facilitator in his community so he can provide workshops to his neighbors and friends.

"I believe that God's word can have a powerful impact in our lives if we reflect on it. I hope that my leadership can have an impact on the participants. There are many issues that affect the youth now. It is important that they strengthen their faith in God to guide them," Jay explains.

In a spiritual nurture workshop, participants read Bible verses then express their reflection through art, which they share with other participants.

"My favorite verse is Genesis 28:15 where God said that He will be with us wherever we go and He will watch over us. I want to share that to others so that they will be reminded that God is with them especially during their darkest times," says Jay.



JOY Inspired and empowered

One of Regine's earliest memories as a World Vision sponsored child was being regularly summoned to the barangay hall with her fellow sponsored children.

"Every weekend, World Vision sponsored children in our area would gather together and do all sorts of activities. We studied the Bible with youth leaders, organized feeding programs for street children. We choreographed Christmas presentations, learned about children's and women's rights," Regine recalls fondly.

"World Vision has such a significant impact on my life. Whenever I feel discouraged, I read the letters my fellow sponsored children wrote to me in the leadership workshop," Regine says. "Their kind words remind me what I accomplished back then, what I can accomplish now. Aside from helping my family, World Vision also empowered me."



JUSTICE Sowing seeds of peace

Norhan is a trained facilitator of World Vision's Empowering Children as Peacebuilders project. At first, he was worried that his fellow youth would not take him seriously because they're of the same age.

"I was proven wrong. I really appreciate the fact that I can influence my fellow children in advocating for peace," Norhan says. "I taught them how to understand individual perceptions. It is very important to be more open-minded in accepting each other's differences and beliefs. This way, we will know how to avoid conflicts among people."

"The ECaP curriculum is a guiding tool used by World Vision to empower children and youth to embody the principles of respecting diversity and gender," shares Project Manager Adonis Casinillo. "It also covers context sensitivity, non-violent involvement, and developing a relationship with God, others, self, and nature."

CHILD PROTECTION AND PARTICIPATION

It takes a world to protect children from violence, abuse, and exploitation. This is why World Vision mobilizes children, families, schools, and communities to tackle the root causes of violence against children. Aside from building and strengthening children and parents' capacities to advocate for child protection in the community level, we also partner with government agencies and like-minded organizations to push for policies against the worst forms of child labor and online sexual exploitation of children.



HOPE A leader in the making

"I went to leadership trainings and attended seminars that taught me about children's rights, the UNCRC (United Nations Conventions on the Rights of the Child), HIV and AIDS, online sexual exploitation of children, and online safety," Alyza says, explaining how World Vision has honed her to be a child leader.

"World Vision has helped me in so many ways. Back then, I used to be a mere participant in their trainings and activities. Those same trainings are the reason why I've overcome my weaknesses and became a child leader today," Alyza says with a smile. "I hope more people would sponsor young girls like me. We have lots of talents and skills that are just waiting to be discovered and honed."



JOY Ending violence through child participation

During the Municipal Council for the Protection of Children meeting, barangay children's associations in Zamboanga del Norte were given the opportunity to present children's issues and concerns. Stakeholders responded by providing clarifications and recommendations, including commitments to support plans for children and youth's development.

"I felt so nervous presenting about children's issues and concerns in front of the local stakeholders. But at the same time, I'm grateful for the opportunity to be an instrument and a representative of all children in our community," shares Princess, a youth leader.

Her fellow youth leader, Lea, felt the same. "It is my first time to talk and share my understanding about violence against children on the radio. I felt a little bit anxious, however, I am still glad that World Vision gave me the chance to explore and share my learnings to other children," Lea says.



JUSTICE Passion and compassion

"I don't like to see parents who maltreat their children, neither do I want to see children being exploited on social media," says Laot, a father to seven children.

Laot is an active member of the Barangay Peacekeeping Action Team (BPAT) or village peacekeepers in his community. He attended World Vision's training on child protection, which deepened his understanding and knowledge of children's rights.

"After the Marawi siege, World Vision helped us recover and comfort us during our dark times," he shares. "I would like to thank World Vision for your untiring support."

SAVINGS AND LIVELIHOOD

Stable sources of income give families the ability to provide healthcare, nutritious food, and quality education to their children. We help parents and caregivers expand their income streams by teaching them about savings and credit mechanisms, and providing additional and alternative livelihood opportunities that they can sustain in the long term.



HOPE Sewing hope

Janica recalls how they struggled to make both ends meet. "My husband's income wasn't enough. I didn't have any work. It was difficult for us to provide for our daily needs, especially our children."

When she received cash assistance from World Vision's Childhood Rescue Project, Janica went to the city to buy a sewing machine, fabrics, and threads. She opened her sewing business the next day. Soon after, the community learned about her business and they began to have their clothes repaired and made.

"World Vision's financial assistance really changed our lives, especially my children," Janica says. "The income that I have for sewing clothes is used to buy the basic needs of our children at home."



JOY A sweet victory

"I joined a community savings group named CoMSCA in our neighborhood. It is where I save money and borrow some for my business," she shares.

Maricris' first loan was used to buy sacks of flour. Her second loan was used to buy a bigger mixer. She bought more baking ingredients using her third loan. With the new equipment, Maricris is now able to bake more cakes.

"I am happy because I am in a place where I can improve my business and earn more for my family, especially since most of my children are in college," she shares. "I am thankful to CoMSCA for allowing me to grow my business."

World Vision's Community Managed Savings and Credit Association (CoMSCA) is an economic development program that builds households' economic resilience and financial literacy by mobilizing self-help mechanisms on savings and credit services.



JUSTICE Expanded capacities

Stay-at-home mothers can make a living too.

In partnership with the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), and Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA), World Vision conducted livelihood workshops focused on food processing, nail technology, massage techniques, and dressmaking. Trainees also learned about the importance of budgeting and saving.

"My husband met an accident that left him disabled. I was worried about our family's income because he could no longer go to work. Thankfully, this project arrived right on time to help us get back on our feet," shares Josephine, a young mother who participated in World Vision's Home-based Livelihood Support program, where she learned how to make homemade process food.

World Vision implemented the project to support vulnerable families during the pandemic.

Disasters put children's well-being, health and safety at risk, interfere with their education, drive them away from home, and deprive them of their most basic needs. We reduce children's vulnerabilities to both natural and manmade calamities by equipping families and communities with life-saving disaster preparedness skills, and delivering timely and adequate relief, rehabilitation, and recovery assistance.



HOPE A source of optimism

World Vision sponsored child Kenneth took shelter in his grandmother's house after Typhoon Odette (Rai) turned their own house upside down. His family were only able to save a few items.

Despite what happened, Kenneth remains cheerful, playing with his cousins and siblings. "We love running around," he says with a smile.

Kenneth's family received food packs containing rice, canned goods, brown sugar, instant noodles, and distilled water from World Vision. "These food items will help our family survive for days, especially since I have five kids and my husband has no regular work," Malyn, Kenneth's mother, explains.

Aside from food packs, World Vision provided hygiene kits, kitchen kits, non-food items, shelter kits, and water purification kits to families hit by the typhoon.



JOY Simple delights

Chris Jane sprinted home when the World Vision truck arrived in the nearby town hall. Smiling from ear to ear, she grabbed her grandmother's hand and directed her to the queue.

After several minutes, Chris Jane and her grandmother brought home relief items from World Vision. The young girl's eyes widened when she held a bath soap and a toothbrush set – her favorites among other items. She also felt relieved when she saw the mosquito net from a different box.

Chris Jane and her grandparents evacuated to a school when Typhoon Odette struck. Unfortunately, the roof of the building also got blown away.

"We had to run towards a neighbor's house. Carried Chris Jane, who was crying hard that time," shared Bernardino, Chris Jane's grandfather. "I am glad to see her this happy because we really went through a terrible experience."



JUSTICE Amidst the ruins

On October 2019, a 6.5 magnitude earthquake struck Mindanao.

"I was washing plates when the earthquake happened," narrates Charice. "I was so worried and scared. I looked for my parents and siblings. They were working in the farm, I thought something happened to them."

Amidst the difficulties, help knocked on their door. "World Vision visited us and provided us our immediate needs. We were given relief goods. I even received school supplies to continue my education," Charice says.

The unfortunate experience she had made her appreciate their farm more.

Charice also realized the importance of taking care of the environment to avoid disasters and address climate change. "It would be very good if we could plant more trees to save the earth."

ADVOCACY

Proactively advocating for the rights of children in issues that directly affect them ensures that policies and systems are in place to address their needs and protect them from harm. We do this by providing child-focused perspectives and involving children in dialogues and consultations with duty-bearers.

In 2022, World Vision influenced at least **82** policies, including **8** national-level, on child well-being. These milestones benefitted around **42.2 million** children in the Philippines, 31 million of whom are vulnerable.







Notes to the Financial Statements As at and for the years ended September 30, 2022 and 2021 (In the notes, all amounts are shown in Philippine Peso unless otherwise stated)

Note 1 - General information

World Vision Development Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation"), a non-stock, non-profit organization, was registered with the Philippine Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) on July 12, 1995. Its primary purpose is to engage in Christian, humanitarian, charitable, organization, community development, childcare, relief, rehabilitation, advocacy, and similar activities for children, their communities and families. The activities of the Foundation are financed by grants from World Vision International (WVI), World Vision Support Offices as well as in-country sponsors and donors.

The Foundation is part of an international partnership of Christians whose mission is to work with the poor and oppressed to promote human transformation, seek justice and bear witness to the good news of the Kingdom of God. This mission is pursued thru integrated, holistic commitment to transformational development, emergency relief, promotion of justice, strategic initiatives, public awareness and witness to Jesus Christ.

The Foundation, being a non-stock, non-profit organization, is a tax-exempt entity under Section 30 (E) and (G) of the National Internal Revenue Code (NIRC) of 1997 with respect to its income from activities conducted in pursuit of the objectives for which the Foundation was established. However, income on any of its properties, real or personal, or from any activity conducted for profit, regardless of the disposition of such income, is subject to income tax. Excess of supports over expenses are used for programs and projects planned for succeeding years.

On July 13, 2021, the Foundation was re-accredited by the Philippine Council for Non-governmental Organization Certification, Inc. as a donee institution valid until May 26, 2024 in accordance with the Philippine Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) Regulations No. 13-98.

The Foundation's registered office address, which is also the place of business, is at 389 Quezon Avenue corner West 6^{th} Street, West Triangle, Quezon City.

The financial statements have been approved and authorized for issuance by the Board of Trustees (BOT) on January 13, 2023.

Note 2 - Cash in banks

Cash in banks earn interest at the prevailing bank deposit rates.

Cash in bank totaling to P112 million in 2022 (2021 - P146 million) are for use for fundraising and local and international donor designated projects.

The Foundation has foreign currency denominated cash amounting to USD1.46 million as at September 30, 2022 (2021 - USD0.90 million).

Interest income earned on cash in bank for the year ended September 30, 2022 amounted to Po.22 million (2021 - Po.32 million).

Accounts receivables pertain to funding in transit for KOICA project, accrued bank interest, receivables from payment gateways and from other contracts.

Employee salary advances are non-interest bearing and collected through payroll deductions. Salary advances of employees are payable by the employees within twelve (12) months or less on an installment basis with a maximum amount of three (3) month salary.

Advances to employees are liquidated within seven (7) days after activity implementation and should be returned in full if remains unsettled 30 days after activity implementation.

Based on the specific and collective assessment done by management, the Foundation has not recognized an allowance for impairment losses on receivables for both years.

Refundable deposits are related to lease agreements that will be refunded after all valid claims, based on joint assessment, have been cleared at the expiration of the lease contract.

Prepaid rent pertains to current portion of advance rental payment made for a short-term lease, which will be amortized within one (1) year.

In 2022, the non-current portion of refundable deposits is P1.105 million (2021 - P1.035 million).

For the years ended September 30, 2022 and 2021, the weighted average incremental borrowing rate the Foundation used is 5%.

Extension and termination options are included in a number of leases of the Foundation. These are used to maximize operational flexibility in terms of managing the assets used in the Foundation's operations. All the extension and termination options are exercisable upon agreement of both the Foundation and the respective lessors.

Note 9 - Retirement benefits

The Foundation has a funded, non-contributory defined benefit retirement plan covering all permanent and regular employees, which provides a retirement benefit ranging from 100% to 140% of the latest effective salary for every year of services.

The normal retirement age is 60 years regardless of years of service and optional retirement date is at age 50 or completion of at least ten (10) years of service.

The retirement obligation is determined using the "Projected Unit Credit" (PUC) method. Under the PUC method, the annual normal cost for the portion of the retirement is determined as the amount necessary to provide for the portion of the retirement benefit accruing during the year. These are determined in accordance with the actuarial valuation made for the plan. The Foundation's latest actuarial valuation is as at September 30, 2022.

Under the existing regulatory framework, BIR Revenue Regulation (RR) No. 1-68 requires that the Retirement Fund be administered by a trust (trusteed); that forfeitures arising for any reason shall not be applied to increase the benefits under the Plan but shall instead be retained in the Retirement Fund of a formal, tax-qualified retirement plans and be used as soon as possible to reduce the Foundation's future contributions; and that the corpus or income of the Retirement Fund must at no time be used for, or diverted to, any purpose other than for the exclusive benefit of the Plan members.

The general administration of the Retirement Plan and the management of the Retirement Fund is the responsibility of the Retirement Plan Trustee, which is appointed by the Foundation in the Trust Agreement executed between the Foundation and the duly appointed Retirement Plan Trustee. The Retirement Plan Trustee may also seek the advice of counsel, as well as appoint an investment manager or managers to manage the Retirement Fund, an independent accountant to audit the Fund, and an actuary to value the Retirement Fund.

There are no unusual or significant risks to which the Retirement Plan exposes the Foundation. The Foundation is also not required to prefund the defined benefits payable under the Retirement Plan before these are due. As such, the amount and timing of contributions to the Retirement Fund are at the Foundation's discretion. However, in cases where a benefit claim arises, and that the Retirement Fund is insufficient to cover such claim, the unfunded portion of the claim shall immediately be due and payable from the Foundation to the Retirement Fund.

Included in grants and donations for 2022 are donations for sponsorship services, KOICA Maternal New Born Child Health and Safe School in Samar Project, Typhoon RAI (Odette) Emergency Response, Auto Mechanic Training Centre, and Maguindanao DRR Resilience Project, among others. In 2021, grants and donations were intended for sponsorship services, Typhoon Goni Emergency Response, Auto Mechanic Centre, Capacity Building for BTA for Supporting Social Re-integration of Former Women Soldiers, PHINLA Livelihood, Pro Futuro Digital Education Project, Fragile Context Program Approach in Child Protection Capacity Development in fragile areas in Mindanao projects, among others.

(b) Other supports

Other supports account includes gain from sale of property and equipment and other local supports amounting to P3.74 million in 2022 (2021 - P3.31 million).

Note 15 - Income taxes

The Foundation, as a non-stock, non-profit organization, is exempt from payment of income tax as set forth in Section 30 (e) of RA 8424. However, the Foundation is subject to corresponding internal revenue taxes under NIRC, as amended, on income derived from any of its properties, real or personal, or any activity conducted for profit regardless of the disposition thereof.

In 2022, the Foundation realized gain on certain disposals of property and equipment and net service income amounting to Po.51 million (2021 - Po.34 million), which was subjected to regular corporate income tax of Po.13 million in 2022 (2021 - Po.086 million).

Note 16 - Financial risk and fund risk management

16.1 Financial risk management

The Foundation's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The Foundation's overall risk management program focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimize potential adverse effects on the Foundation's financial performance.

The BOT approves formal policies for overall risk management, as well as written policies covering specific areas, such as market risk, credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Foundation's risk management policies are summarized below:

- (a) Market risk
- (i) Foreign exchange risk

Foreign currency transaction exposure arising on normal operations, in respect of both external and related party transactions. The Foundation is exposed to foreign exchange risk arising from the effect of fluctuations in foreign exchange rates on its US Dollar denominated transactions and balances. Foreign exchange risk arises when future commercial transactions, and recognized assets and liabilities are denominated in a currency that is not the Foundation's functional currency. Among others, management monitors the timing of settlements/payments to ensure that the Foundation is not unfavorably exposed to fluctuations of foreign exchange rates.

The Foundation assessed the impact of changes in US Dollar-Philippine Peso exchange rates as at September 30, 2022 and 2021 in demonstrating sensitivities to a possible reasonable change in Philippine Peso exchange rates. Comparing the average US Dollar-Philippine Peso exchange rates at September 30, 2022, the US Dollar strengthened by 1.40% against Philippine Peso from September 30, 2021 to 2022 (strengthened by 0.69% from September 30, 2020 to 2021) based on analysis performed using average movements of the US Dollar against Philippine Peso. If the US Dollar had strengthened/weakened by 1.40% at September 30, 2022 (by 0.69% at September 30, 2021) against Philippine Peso with all other variables held constant, post-tax excess of supports over expenses for the year and equity would have been P2 million higher or P0.45 million lower, respectively (2021 - P0.5 million higher or P0.3million lower, respectively), mainly as a result of foreign exchange gains/losses on translation of US Dollar-denominated financial assets and liabilities.

(b) Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that the counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Foundation. Credit risk arises from cash in banks, financial assets at amortized cost, receivables (excluding advances to employees subject to liquidation) and refundable deposits.

With respect to credit risk, the exposure of the Foundation to credit risk arises from the default of the counterparty. There is no significant concentration of credit risk in the Foundation.

The maximum exposure to credit risk for the components of the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balance approximates their carrying values as at September 30, 2022 and 2021.

(i) Cash in bank

The Foundation deposits its cash in banks in universal banks to minimize credit risk exposure. The management assessed that the expected credit loss is immaterial.

(ii) Receivables

The credit quality of receivables can be assessed by reference to internal credit ratings (if available) or to historical information about counterparty default rates as follows: (a) high grade pertains to receivables with no default in payment; (b) medium grade pertains to receivables with up to three (3) defaults in payment; and (c) low grade pertains to receivables with more than three (3) defaults in payment.

As at September 30, 2022 and 2021, receivables categorized as stage 1 - performing are viewed by management as high grade with immaterial expected credit loss rate, considering the collectability of the financial assets and the credit history of the counterparties.

The Foundation's stage 2 - underperforming receivables have an age of 30 days to more than 90 days and with immaterial expected credit loss rate of less than 1%.

(iii) Financial assets at amortized cost

Financial assets at amortized cost are investments in debt securities in companies with good financial capacity. These are assessed by management as high grade, hence, the assessed expected credit loss is immaterial.

(iv) Refundable deposits

Refundable deposits include cash required from the Foundation in relation to its lease agreements. Refundable deposits are assessed as high grade as there was no history of default and these are collectible at the end of the lease term. The expected credit loss is deemed immaterial.

(c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the potential of not meeting obligations as these become due because of an inability to liquidate assets or obtain adequate funding.

The Foundation seeks to manage its liquidity profile to be able to finance its charitable programs and pay for its liabilities with its creditors. To cover its financing requirements, the Foundation uses funds provided by related parties and from local fund-raising.

As part of its liquidity risk management program, the Foundation regularly evaluates the projected and actual cash flow information.

The amounts disclosed in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows. Balances equal their carrying balances, as the impact of discounting is not significant. Non-current portion of lease liabilities approximates market rates.

16.2 Fund risk management

The primary objective of the Foundation's fund management policy is to ensure that the fund balance is maintained at an adequate level. The Foundation manages its fund structure and makes adjustments to it, in light of changes in economic conditions. No changes were made in the objectives, policies and procedures during the years ended September 30, 2022 and 2021.

16.3 Fair value measurement

The carrying values of cash and receivables approximate their fair values as at reporting periods due to their short-term maturities.

The carrying value of refundable deposits approximates their fair value as the impact of discounting is not significant.

The carrying value of financial assets at amortized cost approximates their fair value as it is carried at amortized cost using effective interest method.

The Foundation does not have non-financial assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value.

Note 17 - Critical accounting estimates, assumptions and judgments

Estimates, assumptions and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The Foundation makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are disclosed below:

17.1 Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

(a) Estimating retirement benefit obligation

The determination of the obligation and retirement costs is dependent on the selection of certain assumptions by management used by the actuary in calculating such amounts. Those assumptions are described in Note 9 and include, among others, discount rates and salary increase rates. While the Foundation believes that the assumptions are reasonable and appropriate, significant differences in actual experience or significant changes in assumptions materially affect retirement benefit obligation. The assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date and are adjusted as necessary to reflect the current circumstances.

The sensitivity analyses are based on a change in an assumption while holding all other assumptions constant. In practice, this is unlikely to occur, and changes in some of the assumptions may be correlated. When calculating the sensitivity of the defined benefit obligation to significant actuarial assumptions, the same method (present value of the defined benefit obligation calculated with the projected unit credit method at the end of the reporting period) has been applied as when calculating the retirement benefit obligation recognized within the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balance. The methods and types of assumptions used in preparing the sensitivity analysis did not change compared to the previous period.

(b) Estimation of useful lives of property and equipment

The useful life of each of the Foundation's property and equipment is estimated based on the period over which these assets are expected to be available for use. Such estimation is based on a collective assessment of industry practice, internal technical evaluation and experience with similar assets. The estimated useful life of each asset is reviewed periodically and updated if expectations differ from previous estimates due to physical wear and tear, technical or commercial obsolescence and legal or other limits on the use of the asset. It is possible, however, that future results of operations could be materially affected by changes in the amounts and timing of recorded expenses brought by changes in the factors mentioned. Based on management's assessment, any sensitivity to change is deemed immaterial.

(c) Incremental borrowing rate

To determine the incremental borrowing rate, the Foundation uses recent third-party financing as a starting point, adjusted to reflect changes in financing conditions since third party financing was received. The discount rates applied by the Foundation are disclosed in Note 8. Based on management's assessment, any sensitivity to change is deemed immaterial.

17.2 Critical judgments in applying the Foundation's accounting policies

(a) Impairment of property and equipment

The Foundation assesses impairment on property and equipment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. The factors that the Foundation considers important which could trigger an impairment review include the following:

- Significant underperformance relative to expected historical or projected future operating results;
- Significant changes in the manner of use of the acquired assets or the strategy for overall business;
- Significant negative industry or economic trends.

If any indicator exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less cost to sell or value in use. Accordingly, whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognized.

Management assessed that there are no impairment indicators affecting the Foundation's property and equipment as at September 30, 2022 and 2021.

(b) Determining functional currency

Based on the economic substance of the underlying circumstances relevant to the Foundation, the functional currency has been determined to be the Philippine peso. The Philippine peso is the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Foundation operates and the currency that mainly influences its project costs and other operating expenses.

(c) Determining classification of financial instruments

The Foundation classifies a financial instrument, or its component parts, on initial recognition as a financial asset, a financial liability or an equity instrument in accordance with the substance of the contractual agreement and the definitions of a financial asset, a financial liability or an equity instrument. The substance of a financial instrument, rather than its legal form, governs its classification in the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balance.

Note 18 - Summary of significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

18.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared in accordance with Philippine Financial Reporting Standards (PFRS). The term PFRS in general includes all applicable PFRS, Philippine Accounting Standards (PAS) and interpretations of the Philippine Interpretations Committee (PIC), Standing Interpretations Committee (SIC) and International Financial Reporting Interpretations Committee (IFRIC) which have been approved by the Financial Reporting Standards Council (FRSC) and adopted by the SEC.

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of plan assets which is carried at fair value.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with PFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgment in the process of applying the Foundation's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgment or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimations are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note 17.

Changes in accounting policies and disclosures

(a) New standards, amendments to existing standards and interpretations adopted by the Foundation

There are no new standards and interpretations to existing standards that are effective from October 1, 2022 and adopted by the Foundation that have significant impact to the financial statements of the Foundation.

(b) New standards, and amendments and interpretations to existing standards not yet adopted

There are no other standards, amendments and interpretations to existing standards effective after October 1, 2022 that are expected to have a material impact on the Foundation's financial statements.

18.2 Cash in banks

Cash consist of deposits held at call with banks. These are carried in the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balance at amortized cost. Other relevant policies are discussed in Note 18.3.

18.3 Financial instruments

- (a) Classification
- (i) Financial assets

The Foundation classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value (either through other comprehensive income or through profit or loss), and
- those to be measured at amortized cost.

The classification depends on the Foundation's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

For assets measured at fair value, gains and losses will either be recorded in profit or loss or OCI. For investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading, this will depend on whether the Foundation has made an irrevocable election at the time of initial recognition to account for the equity investment at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI).

Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortized cost.

The Foundation reclassifies debt investments when and only when its business model for managing those assets changes.

The Foundation only holds financial assets measured at amortized cost as at September 30, 2022 and 2021. These consist of cash in banks (Note 2), accounts receivables (Note 3), refundable deposits (Note 4) and investments in government securities (Note 6).

(ii) Financial liabilities

The Foundation classifies its financial liabilities in the following categories:

- financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss (including financial liabilities held for trading and those that are designated at fair value); and
- financial liabilities at amortized cost.

The Foundation's financial liabilities are limited to financial liabilities at amortized cost. Financial liabilities at amortized cost are contractual obligations which are either to deliver cash or another financial asset to another entity or to exchange financial assets or financial liabilities with another entity under conditions that are potentially unfavourable to the Foundation. These are included in current liabilities, except for maturities greater than 12 months after the reporting date, which are then classified as noncurrent liabilities. The Foundation's financial liabilities under this category comprise accounts payables and accrued expenses (excluding government payables) (Note 7) and lease liabilities (Note 8) in the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balance.

(b) Recognition and derecognition

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognized on trade-date, the date on which the Foundation commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Financial liabilities not carried at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognized at fair value plus transaction costs. Financial liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognized at fair value, and transaction costs are recognized as expense in profit or loss.

Financial assets are derecognized when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the Foundation has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership.

Financial liabilities are derecognized when the obligation is discharged or is cancelled or has expired.

(c) Measurement

At initial recognition, the Foundation measures a financial asset and liability at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL), transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial instrument.

Subsequent to initial recognition, measurement depends on the Foundation's business model for managing the asset and cash flow characteristic of the asset. For financial assets at amortized cost, interest income, if any, from these financial assets is included within other income in the statement of supports and expenses using the effective interest rate method. Impairment losses are presented as separate line item, when material, in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities at amortized cost are initially recognized at fair value of the consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs. Financial liabilities at amortized cost are subsequently measured at amortized cost using effective interest method.

(d) Impairment

The Foundation assesses on a forward-looking basis the expected credit loss associated with its debt instruments carried at amortized cost. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk. For financial assets at amortized cost, the Foundation applies the simplified approach permitted by PFRS 9, which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognized from initial recognition of the financial assets at amortized cost.

The fair value of assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market (for example, over-the-counter derivatives) is determined by using valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximize the use of observable market data where it is available and rely as little as possible on entity specific estimates. If all significant inputs required to fair value an instrument are observable, the asset or liability is included in Level 2. If one or more of the significant inputs is not based on observable market data, the asset or liability is included in Level 3.

18.5 Prepayments and other current assets

Prepayments and other current assets are expenses paid cash and recorded as assets before these are used or consumed as the services or benefits will be received in the future. Other assets expected to be realized within 12 months after the reporting period are classified as current assets, otherwise these are classified as non-current assets. Prepayments and other current assets expire and are recognized as expenses in the statement of supports and expenses either with the passage of time or through use or consumption/utilization.

18.6 Property and equipment

Property and equipment, except for land, are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and amortization, and impairment losses, if any. Land is carried at cost less impairment losses, if any. The initial cost of an item of property and equipment includes its construction cost, purchase price and any directly attributable costs of bringing the asset to its working condition and location for its intended use. Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Foundation and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognized. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the financial period in which these are incurred. In situations where it can be clearly demonstrated that the expenditures have resulted in an increase in the future economic benefits expected to be obtained from the use of an item of property and equipment beyond its originally assessed standard of performance and the cost can be reliably measured, the expenditures are capitalized as an additional cost of property and equipment and is depreciated using the remaining estimated useful life of the related property and equipment.

Land is not depreciated. Depreciation and amortization are computed using the straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

Leasehold improvements are amortized over the term of the lease or the estimated useful life of 5 years whichever is shorter.

The assets residual values, useful lives and depreciation and amortization methods are reviewed and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting period.

When property and equipment are retired or otherwise disposed of, the cost and the related accumulated depreciation and amortization and accumulated impairment losses, if any, are removed from the accounts and any resulting gain or loss is credited to or charged against current operations.

18.7 Impairment of non-financial assets

Assets that have an indefinite useful life are not subject to amortization and are tested annually for impairment. Assets that have definite useful life are subject to amortization and are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use. For the purposes of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash flows (cash-generating units). Non-financial assets other than goodwill for which an impairment loss has been recognized are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at each reporting date.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset or cash-generating unit is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but the increased carrying amount should not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset or cash-generating unit in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognized as income immediately and credited to other income in profit or loss.

18.8 Accounts payable and accrued expenses

Accounts payable and accrued expense are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. These are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one (1) year or less. If not, these are presented as non-current liabilities.

Accounts payable and accrued expenses are recognized initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortized cost using effective interest method. These are derecognized when the obligation is settled, cancelled or has expired. Other relevant policies are disclosed in Note 18.3. Payables to government agencies are not considered financial liabilities but are derecognized similarly.

18.9 Borrowings

Borrowings are recognized initially at fair value, net of transaction costs incurred. Borrowings are subsequently carried at amortized cost; any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption value is recognized in profit or loss over the period of the borrowings using the effective interest method.

Borrowings are derecognized when the obligation is settled, cancelled or has expired.

General and specific borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalization.

All other borrowing costs are recognized in profit or loss in the period in which these are incurred.

18.10 Employee benefits

(a) Retirement benefits

The Foundation maintains a defined benefit retirement plan which is a retirement plan that is non-contributory in nature, defines an amount of retirement benefit that an employee will receive on retirement, usually dependent on certain factors such as age, years of credited service, and salary.

The asset or liability recognized in the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balance in respect of defined benefit retirement plan is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the end of the reporting period less the fair value of plan assets. The defined benefit obligation is calculated annually by an independent actuary using the projected unit credit method. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows using interest rates of government bonds that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid, and that have terms to maturity approximating to the terms of the related retirement obligation.

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of the defined benefit obligation and the fair value of plan assets.

Remeasurements gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognized in the period in which these occur, directly in fund balance.

Changes in the present value of the defined benefit obligation resulting from plan amendments or curtailments are recognized immediately in profit or loss as past service costs.

(b) Termination benefits

Termination benefits are employee benefits provided in exchange for the termination of an employee's employment as a result of either an entity's decision to terminate an employee's employment before the normal retirement date or an employee's decision to accept an offer of benefits in exchange for the termination of employment.

A liability and expense for a termination benefit is recognized at earlier of when the entity can no longer withdraw the offer of those benefits and when the entity recognizes related restructuring costs. Initial recognition and subsequent changes to termination benefits are measured in accordance with the nature of the employee benefit, as either post-employment benefits, short-term employee benefits, or other long-term employee benefits.

(c) Short-term employee benefits

The Foundation recognizes a liability and an expense for short-term employee benefits which include salaries, social security contributions, paid sick and vacation leaves, and bonuses. The Foundation recognizes a provision where contractually obliged or where there is a past practice that has created a constructive obligation.

Obligations for employee benefits are derecognized when settled, cancelled or has expired.

18.11 Fund balance

The amount included in fund balance includes accumulated excess of support over expenses from the Foundation's activities. This account relates to operating fund account in the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balance. The fund balance may also include effect of changes in accounting policy as may be required by the standard's transitional provisions.

18.12 Supports, other income and cost and expenses

(a) Supports and other receipts

Supports are recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Foundation and the amount of support can be measured reliably.

(i) Grants and donations

Grants and donations are recognized upon actual receipt of funds at a point in time or when, there is, reasonable assurance that the grants, donations and other supports will be received, and the grantors'/donors' conditions have been complied with.

(21)

(ii) Other supports

Other supports pertain to income received from other sources or activities incidental to Foundation's regular operations. This includes gain on sale of fixed assets, expenses paid by others on behalf of the Foundation, and unidentified deposits and recognized at a point in time.

(iii) Service income and cost of services

The Foundation recognized service income at a point in time and cost of services on existing revenue contract carried over from last fiscal year. Service income is recognized when the performance obligation is satisfied according to the stipulations stated in the service agreement.

The Foundation is reimbursed based on all-inclusive rates including management costs. Costs are fixed and expressed based on actual working days performed by service providers.

(b) Interest income

Interest income, net of corresponding withholding taxes, is recognized as the interest accrues (taking into consideration the effective yield on the assets).

(c) Cost and expenses

Cost and expenses are recognized as incurred.

18.13 Leases - Foundation as a lessee

Assets and liabilities arising from a lease are initially measured on a present value basis.

(a) Measurement of lease liabilities

Assets and liabilities arising from a lease are initially measured on a present value basis. Lease liabilities include the net present value of the following lease payments:

- fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments), less any lease incentives receivable
- variable lease payments that are based on an index or a rate
- amounts expected to be payable by the lessee under residual value guarantees
- the exercise price of a purchase option if the lessee is reasonably certain to exercise that option
- payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the lessee exercising that option

Lease payments to be made under reasonably certain extension options are also included in the measurement of the liability.

The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease. If that rate cannot be readily determined, which is generally the case for the Foundation's leases, the lessee's incremental borrowing rate is used, being the rate that the individual lessee would have to pay to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of similar value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment with similar terms, security and conditions.

To determine the incremental borrowing rate, the Foundation:

- where possible, uses recent third-party financing received by the individual lessee as a starting point, adjusted to reflect changes in financing conditions since third party financing was received,
- uses a build-up approach that starts with a risk-free interest rate adjusted for credit risk for leases held for entities which do not have recent third party financing, and
- makes adjustments specific to the lease (i.e. term, currency and security).

Lease payments are allocated between principal and interest expense. The interest expense is charged to profit or loss over the lease period so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability for each period.

(b) Measurement of right-of-use assets

Right-of-use assets are measured at cost comprising the following:

- the amount of the initial measurement of lease liability,
- any lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received,
- any initial direct costs, and
- restoration costs.

Right-of-use assets are generally amortized over the shorter of the asset's useful life and the lease term on a straight-line basis. If the Foundation is reasonably certain to exercise a purchase option, the right-of-use asset is amortized over the underlying asset's useful life.

(c) Extension and termination options

In determining the lease term, management considers all facts and circumstances that create an economic incentive to exercise an extension option, or not exercise a termination option. Extension options (or periods after termination options) are only included in the lease term if the lease is reasonably certain to be extended (or not terminated).

The lease term is reassessed if an option is actually exercised (or not exercised) or the Foundation becomes obliged to exercise (or not exercise) it. The assessment of reasonable certainty is revised only if a significant event or a significant change in circumstances occurs, which affects this assessment, and that is within the control of the lessee.

(d) Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

Payments associated with short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognized on a straight-line basis as an expense in the statement of supports and expenses. Short-term leases are leases with a lease term of 12 months or less.

18.14 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when: (a) the Foundation has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events; (b) it is more likely than not that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; and (c) the amount has been reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognized for future operating losses.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognized even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

Provisions are measured at the present value of expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation using a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the obligation. The increase in the provision due to passage of time is recognized as interest expenses. Provisions are derecognized when the obligation is discharged or cancelled, or has expired.

18.15 Contingencies

Contingent liabilities are not recognized in the financial statements. These are disclosed unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits is remote. Contingent assets are not recognized in the financial statements but disclosed when an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

18.16 Related party relationships and transactions

(a) Related party relationship

A related party relationship exists when one party has the ability to control, directly or indirectly through one or more intermediaries, the other party or exercise significant influence over the other party in making financial and operating decisions. Such relationship also exists between and/or among entities which are under common control with the reporting enterprise, or between and/or among the reporting enterprises and their key management personnel, directors, or its trustees.

In considering each possible related party relationship, attention is directed to the substance of the relationship, and not merely the legal form.

(b) Related party transaction

Related party transaction is a transfer of resources, services or obligations between a reporting entity and a related party regardless of whether a price is charged or not.

18.17 Foreign currency transactions and translation

(a) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Foundation are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates (the functional currency). The financial statements are presented in Philippine Peso, which is the Foundation's functional and presentation currency.

(b) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into Philippine Peso using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Outstanding foreign currency denominated monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the exchange rate prevailing at reporting date. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange rate of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the statement of supports and expenses.

18.18 Subsequent events

Post year-end events that provide additional information about the Foundation's position at the reporting date (adjusting events) are reflected in the financial statements. Post year-end events that are not adjusting events are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements when material.

Note 19 - Supplementary information required by the BIR

The following information is presented for the purpose of filing with the BIR and is not required part of the basic financial statements.

19.1 Revenue Regulation (RR) No. 15-2010

(a) Value Added Tax (VAT)

Net receipts from sale of property and equipment and net service income and output VAT accrued by the Foundation for 2022 amounted to Po.51 million and Po.16 million, respectively.

The Foundation treated as outright expenses any input taxes.
