WHEREAS, Section 16 of the Local Government Code states that every local government unit shall exercise the powers expressly granted, those necessarily implied therefrom, as well as powers necessary, appropriate, or incidental for its efficient and effective government, and those which are essential to the promotion of the general welfare;

WHEREAS, Section 468 (4) (v) / Section 458 (5) (xii) / Section 447 (5) (xii) of the Local Government Code authorizes the Sangguniang Bayan to approve measures and adopt quarantine regulations to prevent the introduction and spread of diseases within its territorial jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, African Swine Fever (ASF), a high impact transboundary animal disease (TAD), continues to affect the swine production sector of the Philippines with no vaccine and no known cure to date; resulting in an industry estimate of 36% reduction of national swine inventory impacting both on livelihood and agriculture economy;

WHEREAS, the Department of Agriculture Administrative Circular No. 12 (s. 2019) or the "National Zoning and Movement Plan for the Prevention and Control of ASF" provides for the movement protocols through classification of the country into various zones in an effort to manage, contain and control the ASF virus;

WHEREAS, DA Administrative No. 6 (s. 2021) states the guidelines on the recovery, rehabilitation and repopulation program for ASF-affected the Non- ASF Affected Areas which will facilitate the recovery of the swine industry in the country;

WHEREAS, the Department of Agriculture, likewise, issued DA Administrative Order No. 7 (s.2021) or the "Implementing Guidelines for the Bantay ASF sa Barangay Program" to empower local government officials including those in the barangays on their roles in the disease control programs of the government at the grassroot level for timely detection, management, control and prevention of spread of any diseases, particularly the ASF;

WHEREAS, successful control effort lies on strong collaboration among the Department of Agriculture, with its concerned agencies, the Local Government Units (LGU), and other stakeholders taking ownership of such program, benefitting the farmers;

WHEREAS, Section 6 of DA Administrative Order No. 7 (Series of 2021) Implementing Guidelines for the "Bant ay ASF sa Barangay Program" reiterates the strengthening and institutionalization of LGU Engagement in the implementation of the Bantay ASF Program;

WHEREAS, Proclamation No. 1143 has been issued by the Office of the President, declaring a State of Calamity throughout the Philippines due to the ASF outbreak, for a duration of one (1) year, which may be truncated or extended as deemed necessary. Through this proclamation, all government agencies and LGUs are enjoined to: render full assistance and cooperation with each other, mobilize necessary resources to undertake critical, urgent, and appropriate measures in a timely manner to curtail the further spread of ASF; address the supply deficit in pork products and reduce retail prices; and jumpstart the rehabilitation of the local hog industry;

WHEREAS, to ensure sustainability of the Bantay ASF sa Barangay "BABay ASF" program in the municipality, it is imperative that it be adopted and implemented through a local ordinance;

NOW THEREFORE, premises considered, the Sangguniang Bayan in session assembled, be it ordained that:

Ordinance No. 25-01

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE MUNICIPAL ASF TASK FORCE AND TECHNICAL WORKING GROUP, ADOPTING AND IMPLEMENTING THE “BANTAY ASF SA BARANGAY” OR THE “BABay ASF PROGRAM”, AND PROVIDING POWERS THEREOF, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

BE IT ORDAINED by the Sangguniang Bayan of Inopacan, Leyte that;

SECTION 1. TITLE. This Ordinance shall be known as the “**BABAY ASF ORDINANCE OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF INOPACAN**”.

SECTION 2. DECLARATION OF POLICY.

- 2.1 To strengthen and institutionalize LGU engagement for ASF prevention and control;
- 2.2 To establish an effective ASF monitoring, surveillance and reporting system;
- 2.3 To strengthen biosecurity measures at the farm level and border control;
- 2.4 To intensify awareness campaigns and other capacity building activities;
- 2.5 To assist in the recovery and repopulation of previously affected areas; and;
- 2.6 To generate and mobilize resources for an effective implementation of the program.

SECTION 3. DEFINITION OF TERMS. For the purpose of implementing the provisions of these Ordinance, the following terms shall apply:

3.1 African Swine Fever (ASF) is a severe viral disease that affects all breeds of domestic and wild pigs in the country and has already caused grave production and economic losses in Luzon and other parts of Visayas and Mindanao.

3.2 Biosecurity Volunteer – shall mean a person responsible for preventing the introduction or spread of ASF Virus outside of their native range. He/she performs a variety of tasks, including monitoring and surveillance, implementing Biosecurity Declarations, communicating on operational issues, identifying operational risks or issues and implementing policies and strategies.

3.3 Commercial Farm is a farm category for any farm with a swine population that exceeds the definition of a small-hold farm. In high density areas, commercial farms are further classified into:

3.3.1 Semi-commercial Farm – refer to pig farms with at least:

- 10 to 50 heads of sow; or
- 41 to 500 heads fattener.

3.3.2 Commercial Farm – refer to pig farms with:

- 51 heads of sow or more; or
- 501 heads of fattener or more.

3.4 Community is hereby defined in this Ordinance as a barangay or clustered barangays;

3.5 Contingency Plan outlines the needed plans and procedures in the event of an incursion of the disease

3.6 The Department of Agriculture (DA) is the Executive Branch of the Philippine Government mandated to improve, upgrade and regulate the agricultural sector

3.7 The Department of Agriculture-National Livestock Program is the national program of DA mandated to drive and catalyze the accelerated and sustainable development of the livestock and poultry sub sectors through the formulation of a comprehensive policy, preparation of plans, and implementation of programs and projects.

3.8 The Department of Agriculture-Regional Field Office (DA-RFO) is the regional branch of the DA that facilitates and supervises the formulation and execution of policies, plans and programs of the Department in the respective regions.

3.9 Local Government Unit (LGU) is an administrative and political government unit subsidiary to the national government which could itself consist of sub-units as in the case of a province, a municipality or city.

3.10 Paiwi/Paalaga pertains to the system of rearing animals in some areas in the Philippines whereby the care and management of few animals are delegated to individuals in a community.

3.11 Resident Veterinarians refer to veterinarians employed in more than 300 sow-level farms as defined in the IRR of Republic Act 8485 or the Animal Welfare Act of 1998.

3.12 Small-hold Farm – pursuant to PNS/BAFS 267: 2019: Code of Good Animal Husbandry Practice (GAHP) for Swine, commonly known as backyard farm, it refers to pig farms falling under any of the following:

- With 20 heads of adult pig or lesser and zero head of young;
- With 40 heads of young pigs or lesser; or
- With 9 heads of adult pig or lesser and 21 head of young pigs or lesser.

For this purpose, young pigs refer to unweaned pigs which are a month old or less and adult pigs refer to weaned pigs.

SECTION 4. Creation of Municipal Task Force. By virtue of DA AO No. 43 Series of 2020, an ASF Task Force is hereby created. It shall be the main authority to oversee the implementation of this Ordinance and other related activities as may be provided by rules and regulations and guidelines promulgated by higher authority or mandated by the national laws.

4.1 Composition of Municipal ASF Task Force. A Municipal ASF Task Force, shall be created and be composed of the following:

- **Chairperson** - Municipal Mayor
- **Co-Chairperson** - Municipal Administrator
- **Members** - Representative from:
 - Municipal Planning and Development Officer
 - Municipal Risk and Reduction Disaster Coordinating Council (MDRRMC)
 - Municipal Meat/Sanitary Inspector
 - Municipal Agriculturist Office
 - Municipal Environment and Natural Resources (MENRO)
 - Municipal Health Office (MHO)
 - Philippine National Police (PNP)
 - Municipal Information Office (PIO)
 - Department of Education (DepEd)
 - President, League of Barangays
 - Municipal Agricultural and Fishery Council (MAFC) Chairperson
 - NGO Representative
 - SB Chair, Committee on Food and Agriculture

The Task Force may include other agencies or stakeholders not mentioned in this Ordinance but has an immense part in its

implementation and who shall be named as the expanded members of the Task Force.

A Technical Working Group (TWG) headed by the Municipal Agriculturist and composed of government and private sector stakeholders can be created to serve as the advisory body of the Task Force for the efficient implementation of the BABay ASF Program.

4.2 TECHNICAL SUPPORT TEAMS

Rapid Action Team shall carry out the immediate diagnosis of suspect premises and the initiation and implementation of the stamping out procedures.

- Representatives from:
 - Municipal Meat/Sanitary Inspector
 - Municipal Disaster Risk and Reduction Disaster Coordinating Council (MRRDCC)
 - Philippine National Police

Surveillance Team shall conduct regular surveillance and profiling of swine diseases in the identified priority areas.

- Representative from:
 - Municipal Meat/Sanitary Inspector
 - Municipal Environment and Natural Resources (MENRO)
 - Municipal Health Office (MHO)

Quarantine Team shall conduct periodic identification and consolidation of data on swine population, location, etc.

- Representative from the:
 - Municipal Meat/Sanitary Inspector
 - Philippine National Police

Census Team shall conduct periodic identification and consolidation of data on swine population, location, etc.

- Representative from the:
 - Municipal Information Office
 - Office of the Municipal Agriculturist
 - Private Sector NGOs, CSOs)

IEC Team shall ensure adequate awareness of the general public matters and updates to African Swine Fever.

- Representative from the:
 - Municipal Meat/Sanitary Inspector
 - Municipal Planning and Development Officer
 - LGU Information Office
 - Department of Education
 - Private Sector Representatives (CSOs, NGOs)

Capability Building Team shall conduct trainings and other similar activities to ensure that the stakeholders, including the BV (Biosecurity

SECTION 5. FUNCTIONS OF THE LGU TASK FORCE. The main functions of the LGU ASF Task Force include but are not limited to the following:

- a) Main implementer of the "BABay ASF" Program;
- b) Formulate local issuances, ordinances and contingency plans for the ASF prevention and control measures in the Municipality;
- c) Initiate and coordinate all ASF-related activities including quick response, disease investigation, surveillance, animal movement control, information and education and logistics to relevant agencies such as the National, Regional, City and Municipal ASF Task Force;
- d) Conduct capacity building activities;
- e) Disseminate information, guidelines and memoranda to all stakeholders;
- f) Regularly submit reports to the Local Chief Executive on the status of its activities
- g) Perform such other functions as may be necessary for the full and proper implementation of ASF prevention and control protocols within the Municipality

5.1 Intensify Risk Assessment, Surveillance and Monitoring

5.1.1 To fast track the implementation of this activity, the Liga ng Barangay President is assigned for the Registration and Deputization of Biosecurity Volunteers as well as to assist in the implementation of different animal health programmes shall be readily designated for this purpose. The ASF Task Force, Municipal Agriculturist and the SB Member Chair on Committee on Food and Agriculture must be present prior to tasking assignments.

5.1.1.1 Duties and Responsibilities of Biosecurity Volunteers

1. Barangay Sample Collection in their assigned areas or farm in coordination/supervision of the Municipal Agriculturist in the event that the Municipality does not have a veterinarian employed in their LGU
2. Biosecurity Evaluation and assignment of Biosecurity level in all the farms assigned to the Municipal Agriculturist.
3. On-time Reporting and submission of Weekly ASF

- 4. Regular disease monitoring and biosecurity evaluation of commercial, semi-commercial, paiwi, and small hold farms to their respective LGUs and the summary of which will be submitted to the Provincial Veterinary Office by the Municipal Agriculture Office.
- 5. Immediate reporting of any farms with animals showing clinical signs suggestive of ASF infection for corresponding actions such as surveillance and disease investigations.

5.1.2 Disease Investigation

A disease investigation is prompted when there is a report of a suspect case of ASF in the area. The Municipal ASF Task Force in coordination with the Provincial ASF Task Force (PATF) and Regional ASF Task Force (RATF) shall act quickly on the reported case by conducting thorough disease investigation and sample collection.

Blood/organ samples to be collected for disease investigation shall come from 30 randomly selected animals preferably exhibiting clinical signs consistent with that of ASF, if the population is greater than 30. If the population is less than 30, samples shall be collected from all pigs in the farm.

A disease investigation activity shall be conducted in accordance with the protocol set in Annex 2 of the DA AO 7.

5.1.3 Surveillance

The following actions shall be done in compliance to the Section 3.3 of the DA AO No. 7 Series of 2021:

- 1. Barangay Clustering and Testing (initial test during exit from quarantine protocol or initial phase of repopulation program and every 6 months thereafter);
- 2. Paiwi/Semi-commercial/Commercial farms Testing every 6 months;
- 3. Slaughterhouse testing (initial test during exit from quarantine protocol or initial phase of repopulation program and every 6 months thereafter)
- 4. Meat Market Testing (initial test during exit from quarantine protocol or initial phase of repopulation program and every 6 months thereafter)

Furthermore, a detailed protocol on surveillance within the 1 km. quarantine area from the ASF infected premise is stipulated in Annex 3 of the said DA AO.

5.2 Strengthen Biosecurity Implementation

5.2.1 Monitoring

5.2.1.1 Conduct monitoring of hog raisers' compliance to ordinances related to control, containment, and prevention of the spread of ASF.

5.2.2 Establishment of HOG Industry Geotagging System

5.2.2.1 Updated Animal Inventory to be submitted to Provincial Veterinary Office January of every year.

5.2.2.2 Master List of Farmers including the name, barangay, animal inventory, coordinates, biosecurity level (must be RSBSA registered)

5.2.2.3 Incident cases/area mapping ASF-affected areas and other swine disease and traceability based on the submitted reports by the Task Force

5.2.2.4 List of Barangay Biosecurity Volunteers endorsed by Municipal Mayor

5.2.3 Structure Modification

5.2.3.1 Clustering of Farmers with at least Biosecurity Level 1 to ensure strict biosecurity implementation.

5.2.3.2 Farm Biosecurity Evaluation every 6 months

5.2.4 Issuance of Hog Transport Pass

5.2.4.1 Facilitate the registration of all hog traders and other logistical support providers and their respective transport vehicles and vessels transacting business in the province with the end view of traceability and maintaining disease free areas thereby achieving safe, clean and orderly handling of commodities throughout the stages of marketing or distribution channels.

5.2.4.2 Regularly submit the list of traders in the municipality which will be forwarded to the DA RFO and the BAI for the issuance of hog transport pass in accordance with Annex 6 of DA AO No. 7 Series of 2021.

5.2.4.3 Ensure that no hog traders and livestock transport carriers shall be allowed to transact business within each province without the Hog Transport Pass (HTP) which shall be a requirement before issuance of Veterinary Health Certificate (VHC).

All livestock transport carriers are required to comply with the biosecurity measures such as cleaning and disinfection as may be imposed by the authorities. Any violation in this guideline by the hog traders and other logistical support providers shall immediately render his/her HTP revoked.

5.2.5 Participate in Capability Building and Awareness Campaign

5.2.5.1 Orientation of ASF Task Force members on their roles, responsibilities and expected outputs;

5.2.5.2 Training of the Barangay Biosecurity Volunteers;

5.2.5.3 Conduct awareness campaigns to ensure that biosecurity protocols are duly observed by the farmers, discouraging the use of swill as feed for hogs and bringing farmers to register in the Farmer Registry developed for livestock farmers. Engagement of agencies including the DA Communications Group, Agriculture and Fisheries Information Division (AFID), Regional Agriculture and Fisheries Information Sections (RAFIS), Agricultural Training Institute (ATI), and local government (Provincial to Municipal Information Office, and all media resources of government shall be involved.

5.2.5.4 Sentinel Animals(must have negative laboratory results on ASF)

- Bioassay 1 at day 7 after cleaning and disinfection
- Bioassay 2 at day 14 after cleaning and disinfection
- Bioassay for all the farms within 500m of infected premise

5.3 Lead the Recovery and Repopulation

5.3.1 Sentinel Program (for ASF Infected Areas)

5.3.1.1 Letter of Intent to undergo Exit from Quarantine Protocol

5.3.1.2 Cleaning and Disinfection of all facilities of the farms within 1km radius of infected premise

5.3.1.3 Validation of Cleaning and Disinfection (must have negative laboratory results on ASF)

- Bioassay 1 at day 7 after cleaning and disinfection
- Bioassay 2 at day 14 after cleaning and disinfection
- Bioassay for all the farms within 500m of infected premise

5.3.1.4 Sentinel Animals(must have negative laboratory results on ASF)

- Screening Test at Day 7
- Screening Test at Day 21
- PCS Test at Day 40

SECTION 6. AUTHORITY GIVEN TO ASF TASK FORCE.

6.1 Regulatory Authority – The Municipal ASF Task Force shall have the authority to regulate movement of live pigs, pork, pork products, by-products and other products with pork ingredients in line with the national issuances and guidelines.

6.2 Visitorial Power – Upon presenting appropriate credentials as part of the local agriculture or veterinary authority such as office identification card and/or PRC license to the owner, manager, operator, agent or any person within the premises, the Municipal ASF Task Force shall have the power to enter and inspect swine farms and other related livestock establishments anytime, conduct disease investigation, surveillance, monitoring and collection of laboratory specimens and samples, impose preventive and control measures therein, in coordination with, and as may be necessary, subject to biosafety and biosecurity entry requirements of concerned farms and establishments.

6.3 Seizure and Confiscation – The Municipal ASF Task Force shall have the authority to seize and confiscate animals, animal carcasses, products, and by-products, feeds, feed ingredients, feed supplements and feed additives, veterinary biologics, drugs, products, products and devices, and such other materials or substances that are undocumented, or of unknown source and conditions, and are showing signs of ASF, or reasonably suspected to be infected with or carriers of ASF, contaminated with ASF or posing an imminent danger, threat and injury to the overall animal health situation in their respective jurisdictions. A seizure and confiscation receipt shall be issued to the farmer concerned indicating the 1) Name of the farmer/farm; 2) Address; 3) Number of pigs and their respective age groups; 4) The circumstances of the pig(s) confiscated; and 5) Legal basis of the seizure and confiscation.

6.4 Animal Condemnation and other Disease Control Measures – The Municipal ASF Task Force shall have the authority to institute condemnation and eradication measures on animals that are diseased or reasonably suspected to be infected with ASF, and are deemed a great risk to the swine population.

SECTION 7. DECLARATION OF FREE STATUS. There are two levels of Declaration of ASF Free Status of an area previously infected with ASF.

The first level is the Municipality Level Local Declaration of ASF Free Status for municipalities with certain barangay/s which have been previously infected with ASF and will be declared ASF Free area by the Provincial ASF Task Force.

The second level is the National Declaration of ASF Free Status for the whole Province to be declared by the Bureau of Animal Industry. All infected barangays of the municipality must be locally declared ASF Free area prior to application to be declared ASF Free on a national level.

The guidelines for the Declaration of ASF Free Status is subject to adaptation as deemed necessary by the DA-BAI.

Section 8. IMPLEMENTING RULES AND REGULATIONS. The provisions of the administrative orders issued by the Department of Agriculture, DA AO No. 6s. 2021 and DA AO No. 7 s. 2021 shall be the implementing rules and regulations for this Ordinance and shall be implemented in the whole Municipality of Inopacan.

Section 9. FUNDS AND RESOURCES. Budgetary requirements for the control and prevention of ASF will be provided by the LGU through allocation of appropriations for operating expenses and incentive and/or compensation allowance for the "BaBay ASF" members.

Section 10. VIOLATIONS/PROHIBITED ACTS. Any person or entity found to have committed any of the following instances/acts shall be deemed in violation of this Ordinance:

10.1 Tampering and falsification of documents such as, but not limited to:

- Veterinary Health Certificate
- Certificate Free Status on ASF
- Laboratory Test Results for ASF
- Weekly Negative Disease Monitoring Report
- Biosecurity Evaluation Form

10.2 Concealment of information

10.3 Removal of diseased animals from quarantine area

10.4 Movement of animals without necessary permits/documents

10.5 Non-Reporting/Delay in reporting

10.6 Interference/Disobedience to persons in authority

10.7 Refusal to farm inspection and conduct of surveillance

10.8 Data privacy issues

Section 11. PENALTY CLAUSE. Any Person who violates any provision of any such guidelines, rule, or regulation of this Ordinance, shall suffer the penalty of fine, as follows:

First Offense	One Thousand Pesos (Php1,000.00)
Second Offense	Two Thousand Pesos (Php2,000.00)
Third and Succeeding Offenses	Two Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (Php2,500.00) and imprisonment of not more than One (1) month or both at the discretion of the Court

Section 12. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE. If, for any reason or reasons, any section or part of this Ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other sections or parts hereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

Section 13. REPEALING CLAUSE AND AMENDING CLAUSE. All orders, rules and regulations or parts thereto which are inconsistent with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed or amended accordingly.

SECTION 14. EFFECTIVITY CLAUSE. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon approval and shall remain in force until expressly revoked.





MINUTES OF THE PUBLIC HEARING OF THE PROPOSED MUNICIPAL ORDINANCES OF THE 15TH SANGGUNIANG BAYAN OF INOPACAN, LEYTE HELD ON OCTOBER 28, 2024 AT THE SB SESSION HALL, NEW TOWN HALL, INOPACAN, LEYTE

4 The proposed Ordinances submitted for public hearing are entitled:

27 The public hearing started at 2:05 in the afternoon with an opening prayer
28 through computer audio and was immediately followed by the singing of the national
29 anthem synchronized with the computer audio.
30

31 The Master of Ceremony (MC), Mr. Narcis Lean, SB Staff, after welcoming
32 and thanked all the participants for their presence and taking part in the legislation
33 process and mentioned the title of the proposed ordinances, acknowledged the
34 Sangguniang Bayan Members, present. He as well acknowledged the Barangay
35 Chairpersons present, including those Barangay Kagawad representing its
36 respective Punong Barangay, and the LGU Department Heads present, including all
37 concerned personnel. The MC encouraged everyone to raise their queries after the
38 discussions of the proposed ordinances, and to introduce themselves first before
39 raising any question.
40

41 The MC gave the floor to the Presiding Officer for a welcome remark. The
42 Chair, after his greetings and expressing thanks to everyone, explained the purpose
43 of conducting a public hearing on the proposed ordinances, that aside from having
44 an agreement as to the tariff rates, the Body is also looking forward to come up with
45 the solution for the issues and concerns, if any. He as well and encouraged
46 everyone to make suggestions for the benefit of all.

47 **“An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. 11-09 and Requiring the Inopacan**
48 **Tricycle Operators and Drivers Association (ITODA) to Secure a Fare Tariff**
49 **Rate”**

50

51 The MC gave the floor to the Author of the above-captioned Ordinance.
52 Honorable Diosdado P. Siao, Author, then discussed the entirety of the same, in
53 details. Among others, in relation to Section 1, Honorable Siao explained that the
54 title of the Ordinance was amended and shall read now as “An Ordinance Amending
55 Ordinance No. 11-09 and Requiring the Inopacan Tricycle Operators and Drivers
56 Association (ITODA) to Secure a Fare Tariff Rate”. He also explained that the
57 acronym “ITODA” is not specified in the existing Ordinance, so in Section 1 and
58 Section 2, ITODA is specified. In Section 3, Honorable Siao emphasized that the
59 proposed Tariff Rate specified is the one submitted by the ITODA, as agreed that
60 said transport group will submit a petition paper for the increased fare rates,
61 considering the old rates stipulated in the existing Ordinance and given as well the
62 actual rates, to date, taking into consideration as well the fuel and maintenance
63 expense. Presented were regular and discounted fare rates. In Section 4,
64 Honorable Siao explained that according to the Municipal Treasurer, Php20.00
65 allocation for the printing of the tariff is no longer sufficient, hence, it has been
66 proposed then to increase the processing fee from Php 20.00 to Php 50.00.
67 Currently, there are no tariff rates displayed at the transport unit which there must
68 supposedly be. The tariff rate will then be signified by the Transport Association
69 Chair. With that, the riding public is aware of the current tariff rate.

70

71 Honorable Siao encouraged each participant to go through the copies
72 provided and as he opened the floor for the open forum to hear out the sentiments
73 from the riding public, Mr. Jimar Manabat, President of ITODA, posed a query
74 regarding the mentioned Php 50.00 processing fee. Honorable Siao replied that the
75 Php 50.00 processing fee is good for the whole tariff duration, unless, when there is
76 an amendment of the Tariff pursuant to an Ordinance. He then asked all the
77 participants if they agree as to the proposed fare rate of ITODA, as stipulated in the
78 proposed Ordinance, and there being no objections.

79

80

81 **“An Ordinance Amending the Title and Certain Sections of Ordinance No. 08-**
82 **02, Series of 2008”**

83

84 Honorable Siao, Author, discussed the entirety of the of the above-captioned
85 proposed Ordinance, intended for the Potpot (Pedikab), E-bike trike and the like and
86 Eco-trike and the like. He emphasized the same as an additional to Section 2 of the
87 existing Ordinance. After explaining the proposed Tariff Rates under Section 4 of the
88 said Measure, he then confirmed from the President of INPODA if the submitted
89 proposed fare rates has already been applied and the latter affirmed the same.

90

91 As Honorable Siao opened the floor for queries, comments and reactions, Mr.
92 Gabino Abenoja, operator/driver, MITODA, raised his complaints as to racial units
93 and that they should not cater commuters for Linao, Guinsanga-an, and even to
94 Mara-o, and they are supposedly be up to Bacong-bacong only. Mr. Ardeña replied
95 that he also informed his Members regarding the complaint. As Honorable Rulete
96 clarifies the particular “waiting shed”, they replied, that one at the corner going to
97 Batuan. Honorable Siao explained the reasons of allowing ITODA up to Bacong-
98 bacong and he emphasized that since the MITODA just opened up and raised its
99 concern, then Mr. Ardeña replied they just cater those passengers requesting their

100 service especially when there is no tricycle on stand-by. Mr. Gavino said that they
101 will allow the ITODA starting from 6PM onwards (no tricycle on stand-by at the
102 terminal). As views and opinions were aired between the two (2) transport group, the
103 Chair emphasized the proposed tariff rates by INPODA. Mr. Abenoja manifested that
104 he reacted as to the tariff rate of INPODA since Linao has been included, which is
105 their route. Honorable Siao asked Mr. Abenoja if Linao will be excluded, will they
106 cater passengers going to Linao, Pabahay, and the latter replied in affirmative.
107 Honorable Siao then reiterate that per Mr. Abenoja, MITODA will cater passengers
108 going to Batuan, Linao and the latter replied. "they will". Views and opinions were
109 aired, with an exemption of the INPODA Member "Eking" who is residing in Batuan.
110

111 Honorable Siao opted to go over and finalize the proposed tariff rate of
112 INPODA and asked the consensus of the riding public, since there being none,
113 Honorable Siao explained the rate for Poblacion to Kobkob is Php 20.00 while from
114 Poblacion to Cemetery is Php 15.00, with the Php5.00 difference the fact that the
115 distance from the cemetery and kobkob is merely near, and the Php5.00 is not
116 justifiable. To this he manifested to have it same, Php15.00 and asked the INPODA.
117 Mr. Ardeña replied about that upper portion of Kobkob and Honorable Siao said that
118 he is referring the "kobkob" along the hi-way (Car wash area). Participants from the
119 other transport group agreed to set the minimum at Php15.00; and it was carried.
120

121 As Mr. Abenoja asked on the penalty for INPODA operators who will be
122 entering in Batuan, Linao with passengers, Honorable Siao suggested to warn the
123 operators and let the Traffic Chief, speak about the matter. Mr. Makuto suggested to
124 impose penalties for the violators. Honorable Dedal manifested adding a certain
125 Section for Penalty and Honorable Siao agreed. Mrs. Emelyn Encabo expressed her
126 side with regards to the issues and explained that in the absence of MITODA
127 tricycles and in cases of emergency, commuters opted to ride e-trikes, especially
128 during weekdays (Monday-Friday) when tricycle units on stand-by are few. The
129 riding public has to wait longer.
130

131 With the issues presented, the Chair asked the time coverage that MITODA
132 can cater the riding public. Mr. Abenoja replied that some units are already at the
133 terminal 6:30 AM to 7:00 AM; and after 5:00 PM, most tricycles are not around
134 considering also the minimal commuters. To this, Mr. Abenoja added that it is okay
135 for the INPODA to cater passengers to Linao, after 5:00 PM. He also manifested that
136 he already had told INPODA however, the latter group still grabbed their passengers
137 before 5:00 PM particularly, at Aura's store. Mr. Ardeña, INPODA President, replied
138 that those waiting for passengers at Aura's Store are "colorum" units. Their
139 designated areas are along the IPA road and tabuan during market days. Honorable
140 Siao remarks that the information is well-noted.
141

142 Since there being no other queries and questions, Honorable Siao manifested
143 to tackle the next proposed Ordinance.
144

145 **"An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. 11-08 and Requiring the Marao**
146 **Inopacan Tricycle Operators and Drivers Association (MITODA) to Secure a**
147 **Fare Tariff Rate"**
148

149 Honorable Siao discussed the entirety of the above-captioned Ordinance and
150 emphasized the proposed tariff rates by MITODA (Mara-o Inopacan Tricycle
151 Operators and Drivers Association), to wit:

152 Poblacion to Linao and Guinsanga-an Php 20.00
153 Poblacion to Mara-o Php 30.00
154

155 Honorable Siao explained that with the proposed tariff rates, it appears that
156 the minimum fare is Php20.00 and he asked the attendees if they are amenable of
157 the same. Hon. Encabo replied she is okay with the Php20.00 for Guinsanga-an.
158

159 Honorable Bernales manifested to relay to the operators of MITODA
160 regarding the issues and concerns raised by the commuters who have been
161 complaining the Php30.00 fare to Mara-o. He then explained to the complainants
162 that as of the moment, he cannot act on it accordingly as the SB is waiting of the
163 proposed tariff rate which will be the basis in crafting an Ordinance. Honorable
164 Bernales emphasized that the commuters wished having the same minimum fare of
165 Php15.00 as the tricycles plying along the hi-way. Considering the enhanced road
166 accessibility, gasoline price and maintenance - the same, and the fact as well that
167 Brgy. Mara-o is nearer than Brgy. Guadalupe, with Poblacion as the point of
168 reference. As far as minimum fare is concerned, then it should be the same and be
169 uniformed at Php15.00, said Honorable Bernales. He also compared the fare rate
170 from Poblacion to Guadalupe which Honorable Siao mentioned, Php22.00;
171 compared to Mara-o which is Php30.00. As views and opinions were aired, Mr.
172 Abenoja explained that before the pandemic time, fare for Mara-o is only Php15.00
173 (7 passengers, with a total collection fare of Php105.00); and Guinsanga-an is at
174 Php10.00. He added that it was due to Covid pandemic that the fare is raised to
175 Php30.00 due to having the most of three (3) commuters only, for only one way. He
176 cited that nowadays, having only three (3) passengers at only Php15.00 fare each,
177 then they will not be earning anymore. Honorable Bernales reiterates that Barangays
178 Mara-o and Guadalupe are the same, as far as road accessibility is concerned, but
179 differs as to the distance from Poblacion. Mr. Manabat said that for ITODA, 1 liter
180 can travel twice (with 5 passengers), and Mr. Abenoja said they too, with 3
181 passengers only. Honorable Bernales remarks that he just brought up the concerns
182 of the riding public since it is timely enough, discussing about the proposed
183 Ordinance. Since it has been noted that even with pot-pot, the fare that has been
184 doubled during the pandemic, do not resume its previous fare rate eventhough the
185 pandemic is over. Honorable Bernales emphasized to have a uniform minimum fare
186 for fair regulations and that he just brought up the complaints of some commuters
187 too. So, it also calls for the action of the MITODA President, regarding the
188 complaints of the commuters. The Chair expound further those commuters of
189 different routes can compare the fare rates. He elaborates that before; the fare is
190 justifiable given the rough roads and the absence of bridges across the rivers. To
191 this, he recommends having the minimum fare of Php 15.00 as the ITODA to make it
192 non-questionable by the riding public. And that the Ordinance will be the legal basis
193 once approved. He explained everything in details. Views, opinions, and suggestions
194 were aired regarding the tariff rate of MITODA.
195

196 After the inputs of Honorable Bernales and the explanation of the Chair,
197 Honorable Siao solicits the comments and suggestions form the participants. Mr.
198 Abenoja opted to raise this matter with his fellow operators since he can't decide on
199 his own. Honorable Rulete also expressed an advice to MITODA. To this, Honorable
200 Siao told him to inform the SB on the outcome of their meeting while the above-
201 captioned Measure is at Second Reading. Honorable Dedal advised Mr. Abenoja to
202 conduct a meeting with their association and update the SB while the draft
203 Ordinance is still on Second Reading. He also explained that with unapproved
204 Ordinance, MITODA cannot collect yet the increased fare rate.

205 Since there being no more to discuss with, the MC gave the floor to the
206 Author of the next Ordinance.

207
208
209 **“An Ordinance Creating the Municipal ASF Task Force and Technical Working**
210 **Group, and Adopting and Implementing the “Bantay ASF sa Barangay” or**
211 **BABay ASF Program”, and Providing Powers thereof, and for Other Purposes”**
212

213 Honorable Dedal explained first that there is a need to craft this Ordinance
214 due to the recurring presence of the African Swine Fever (ASF). He as well
215 expounds in detail the symptoms as well as the impact of ASF, yet, still without
216 treatment, to date. Hence, the Body is into the prevention and crafting protocols to
217 mitigate the spread of the ASF. He then explained the entirety of the above-
218 captioned Measure, with emphasis in the following, among others: *a*) Bantay ASF
219 involves the barangays, not only the Municipal level; *b*) Task Force
220 composition/groups and its respective functions; *c*) mobilization credentials; *d*)
221 disease transmission; *e*) violations; *f*) reporting and monitoring; *f*) penalties.
222

223 After the discussion of Honorable Dedal, Mr. Benedick B. Lawagon, Municipal
224 Agriculturist, suggested having a simplified Municipal Task Force, having entries that
225 are applicable as well to the LGU, for easy reference for the Members of the Task
226 Force as well, in performing their respective functions. He also expressed his
227 sentiments as to the current situation of his Office, given that the livestock in-charge
228 is designated as the LGSO. Another concern also is the absence of a veterinarian
229 and licensed Meat Inspector. So, there is a manpower concern relative the task
230 force. Honorable Dedal agreed to the suggestions of Mr. Lawagon.
231

232 On the other hand, Mr. Lawagon recalled the meeting attended by the
233 Punong Barangays, relative to the implementation of the Bantay ASF sa Barangay
234 pursuant to the Provincial Executive Order, when he requested them to submit the
235 registry of all hog raisers. Sadly, only few had submitted the same.
236

237 Another concern of Mr. Lawagon is the registration of all the dealers so that
238 the LGU could have some control means especially with ASF cases. He explained it
239 in details and emphasized as well not to refrain them from their livelihood. Honorable
240 Dedal acknowledged Mr. Lawagon’s suggestions for as long as it won’t fall to the so-
241 called “trade restriction”. Honorable Dedal recommends to sit down with the
242 Municipal Agriculturist after the Public Hearing to craft a contingency plan/program
243 intended for this draft Ordinance. Mr. Lawagon agreed too.
244

245 Since there were no other suggestions and comments, the MC gave the floor
246 to the Author of the next proposed Ordinance.
247

248
249 **“An Ordinance Declaring a Moratorium on All Mining Activities and the**
250 **Processing of Application of the Same in the Municipality of Inopacan, Leyte**
251 **for a Period of Fifteen (15) Years and Imposing Penalties for the Violation**
252 **Thereof”**
253

254 Honorable Bernales, Auhtor, explained the main purpose and objective of the
255 above-captioned Ordinance. And that the existing Ordinance which has been
256 approved by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan, has already expired, hence, this new
257 one, as the Mayor wanted to protect the environment, thus, regulates mining
258 activities. He explained in details the entirety of the same. Afterwhich, Honorable
259 Bernales, Author, opened the floor for any query.

Honorable Pedro Austero, Punong Barangay of Jubasan informed the Body that one Barangay Kagawad reported to him about digging of a certain lot area. He advised the Kagawad to assess the impact of said activity. And as per information, water has already been stored at the dug portion. As views and opinions were aired, Honorable Bernales emphasized the role of Barangay Officials in this regard. Views and opinions about the negative impact of "kobkob and mina" were also aired.

Honorable Bernales informed the participants that the above Ordinance is at Second Reading the next day (Tuesday Session) and without any objections and amendments then it will proceed to Third and Final Reading the following week which is also the enactment of the same. As he asked the attendees for any suggestions and comments about the Ordinance, and if the fifteen (15) years moratorium is okay, there being no objections.

Since there were no other queries and questions, the public hearing ended at 3:50 in the afternoon, after the MC thanked all the participants for their attendance and participation.
