

**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE COMPREHENSIVE
SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF
PALOMPON, LEYTE, PRESCRIBING POLICIES, MEASURES, INSTITUTIONAL
MECHANISMS, REGULATION INCLUDING THE WASTE MANAGEMENT FOR
TOURISM AND PORT OPERATIONS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR
VIOLATIONS THEREOF, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES**

SECTION 1. TITLE

This Ordinance shall be known as the **“Solid Waste Management Ordinance of the Municipality of Palompon, Leyte.”**

SECTION 2. DECLARATION OF POLICY

It is hereby declared the policy of the Municipality of Palompon to protect, preserve, and enhance the right of every person to a balanced and healthful ecology, consistent with the principles of sustainable development and the mandates of Republic Act No. 9003 (Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000), Republic Act No. 6969 (Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990), Republic Act No. 9593 (Tourism Act of 2009), and the International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships (MARPOL).

SECTION 3. SCOPE AND COVERAGE

This Ordinance shall apply to all persons, natural or juridical, including households, institutions, business establishments, industrial and commercial enterprises, tourism operators, caterers, concessionaires, and port-based entities, within the territorial jurisdiction of the Municipality of Palompon, Province of Leyte.

It shall govern the segregation, storage, collection, transport, processing, recycling, and disposal of all types of solid waste generated from residential, institutional, commercial, industrial, agricultural, and port-related activities, as well as wastes accepted from external generators pursuant to this Ordinance.

A. Geographic Coverage

This Ordinance shall cover all barangays of the Municipality of Palompon, including coastal waters, port areas, ship anchorage zones, tourism destinations such as Kalanggaman Island, and other public or private spaces where waste generation, handling, or disposal may occur.

B. Sectoral Coverage

The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to the following sectors and entities:

1. Households and Residential Areas – including all residents within barangay jurisdictions.
2. Commercial and Business Establishments – including manufacturers, retailers, service providers, hotels, restaurants, caterers, and other enterprises.
3. Industrial and Institutional Establishments – including factories, hospitals, clinics, and offices.
4. Educational Institutions – including public and private schools, colleges, and training centers, which shall implement proper waste segregation, recycling, and ecological waste practices within their premises and coordinate with the Municipal Environment and Eco-Tourism Office (MEETO) for collection schedules and IEC activities
5. Tourism Operations – including island-based concessions, tour operators, food service providers, and other tourism-related enterprises within Palompon.
6. Government Facilities and Public Institutions – including markets, slaughterhouses, terminals, and offices.
7. Industrial and Special Waste Generators – including facilities producing electrical waste (e-waste), hazardous, or special wastes governed by Republic Act No. 6969.
8. Ships, Vessels, and Port-Based Operations – including fishing boats, cargo vessels, passenger ferries, and any other marine craft operating, docking, or mooring within the jurisdiction of Palompon Port or its anchorage areas.

These entities shall manage their ship-generated waste in accordance with the standards of the Philippine Ports Authority (PPA), the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG), and the International Convention for the Prevention of

Pollution from Ships (MARPOL), and shall dispose of such waste only at LGU-accredited waste reception facilities or through authorized collectors.

- 9. External Waste Generators – Wastes generated from neighboring municipalities or jurisdictions may be accepted by the Municipality of Palompon, subject to the conditions, fees, and regulations set forth in this Ordinance and its Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR).

C. Exclusions

This Ordinance shall not cover hazardous, toxic and infectious wastes, including radioactive substances and industrial by-products, which shall be governed exclusively by Republic Act No. 6969 (Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990) and its Implementing Rules and Regulations, and by a separate ordinance enacted by the Municipality of Palompon specifically addressing the management of hazardous, toxic, and infectious wastes.

However, "Special Wastes" as defined under this Ordinance may be accepted, collected, and managed by the Municipality of Palompon through controlled and accredited facilities, in accordance with DENR guidelines and the provisions of Republic Act No. 9003 (Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000).

SECTION 4. DEFINITION OF TERMS

For purposes of this Ordinance, the following terms shall be defined in accordance with R.A. 9003 (Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000) and related laws:

- 1. Biodegradable Waste – Any material that can be broken down by biological processes into simple and stable compounds such as carbon dioxide, water, and biomass (e.g., food waste, garden waste, agricultural waste).
- 2. Bulky Waste – Large waste materials that cannot be collected through regular collection schedules due to size or volume, such as furniture, appliances, and large tree branches.
- 3. Caterers – refers to individuals, enterprises, or service providers engaged in the preparation, cooking, delivery, or on-site serving of food and beverages for public or private events, institutions, or tourism-related activities within the Municipality.
- 4. Centralized Material Recovery Facility (CMRF) - Location: Palompon Eco-Park, Brgy Cantandoy, Palompon, Leyte. A municipal-level facility established, operated, and maintained by the Local Government Unit (LGU) where mixed or residual solid wastes collected from households, establishments, and institutions are delivered for final sorting, recovery of recyclables, composting of biodegradable waste, and proper preparation of residuals for disposal to a sanitary landfill or other DENR-accredited disposal facility. It complements barangay-level MRFs by serving as the final sorting and consolidation point for the entire Municipality.

5. Collection – The act of removing solid waste from the source or storage area to the collection vehicle for transport to a processing or disposal facility.
6. Collection Equipment – Vehicles, trucks, or any mechanical equipment used for collecting and transporting solid waste.
7. Collection Schedule – The officially designated days and time for waste collection as set by the LGU or barangay.
8. Concessionaires – refers to individuals, cooperatives, or business entities operating under a contract, permit, or agreement with the Municipality of Palompon to provide goods, services, or facilities — such as food stalls, souvenir shops, tour operators, or recreational service providers — particularly in tourism zones, island destinations, and port areas.
9. Construction/Demolition Debris – Waste materials generated from construction, renovation, repair, or demolition of structures such as concrete, wood, metals, and other similar debris.
10. Discharge or Set Out – The act of placing solid waste in designated containers or areas for scheduled collection.
11. Domestic Residual Waste – Residual wastes generated from households and domestic activities that cannot be reused, recycled, or composted, such as disposable diapers, soiled packaging materials, used sanitary products, and contaminated plastics.
12. Engineered Sanitary Landfill (SLF) – Location: Sitio Catutuahan, Brgy. Lat-osan, Palompon, Leyte. A waste disposal site designed, constructed, operated, and maintained in a manner that meets environmental standards to prevent adverse impacts on public health and the environment. It includes systems for leachate collection and treatment, gas control, groundwater monitoring, and daily soil cover.
13. Environmentally Friendly Materials – Products and packaging that are reusable, recyclable, or biodegradable, designed to reduce environmental impact.
14. Garbage Collector – A person duly authorized by the LGU or accredited private hauler to collect solid waste.
15. Immediate Surroundings – The physical area within the premises of a household, establishment, or institution that must be kept free from litter or improperly stored waste.
16. Junk Dealer – A business establishment or individual engaged in buying, selling, or trading recyclable materials such as paper, bottles, scrap metal, and plastics.
17. Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) – A facility where waste materials are received, sorted, processed, and stored for recycling and resource recovery, and where compostable materials are also processed.
18. MARPOL (Marine Pollution Convention) – refers to the International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships, 1973, as modified by the Protocol of 1978 (MARPOL 73/78), to which the Republic of the Philippines is a State Party. It is the primary international instrument that regulates the prevention of marine pollution from operational or accidental causes.

including garbage disposal from ships under Annex V (Regulations for the Prevention of Pollution by Garbage from Ships). The Municipality of Palompon shall adopt and localize its relevant provisions for the proper management and reception of ship-generated waste in coordination with the Philippine Ports Authority (PPA) and the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG).

- 19. Non-Biodegradable Waste – Waste materials that cannot be broken down through biological processes, such as plastics, Styrofoam, glass, aluminum, and tin cans.
- 20. Push Cart/Pedicab – Small non-motorized or manually operated vehicles used by waste collectors, scavengers, or junk dealers in gathering or transporting waste.
- 21. Residual Waste – Waste materials that cannot be reused, recycled, or composted and therefore must be disposed of through sanitary landfills and other approved final disposal facilities.
- 22. Scavenging – The unauthorized collection, removal, or picking of waste materials from disposal sites, collection points, or containers.
- 23. Segregation – The systematic separation of solid waste into specified categories such as biodegradable, recyclable, residual, and special wastes for proper handling, processing, and final disposal, in accordance with RA 9003.
- 24. Segregation at Source – The separation of solid waste into categories at the point of generation by households, establishments, and institutions.
- 25. Self-Generated Waste – Waste produced directly by a household, establishment, or institution under its control.
- 26. Solid Waste – All discarded household, commercial, non-hazardous institutional, and industrial wastes. Excluded are hazardous and infectious wastes covered by RA 6969 and related laws.
- 27. Special Collection – A separate waste collection activity conducted outside the regular schedule, usually for bulky waste, yard waste, or special wastes.
- 28. Special Wastes – Household hazardous wastes such as paints, thinners, household batteries, lead-acid batteries, spray canisters, lamps, bulbs, electrical wastes, and other similar items classified under special waste in RA 9003.
- 29. Storage – The interim containment of solid waste in an approved manner at the source or in designated areas while awaiting collection.
- 30. Toxic and Hazardous Waste – Wastes that pose substantial or potential threats to public health and the environment, including household hazardous wastes such as paints, solvents, batteries, pesticides, and health-care wastes.
- 31. Vacant Lot – An unoccupied parcel of land, either private or public, that must be kept clean and free from illegal dumping.
- 32. Yard Waste – Biodegradable waste consisting of grass clippings, leaves, tree branches, and other garden refuse.

SECTION 5. SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT BOARD

The Municipal Solid Waste Management Board (MSWMB) shall be constituted through an Executive Order to be issued by the Municipal Mayor. The Board shall be chaired by the Municipal Mayor, with members from the Sangguniang Bayan (Committee on Environment), the Municipal Environment and Eco-Tourism Office (MEETO), the Department of Education (DepEd), duly accredited NGOs, barangay representatives, the business sector, and the youth sector, in line with RA 9003.

The foregoing shall serve as the minimum composition of the Board. The Municipal Mayor, through the Executive Order, may designate and include additional members from other government agencies, civil society organizations, or stakeholders as may be necessary for the effective implementation of the solid waste management program.

The Board shall be responsible for formulating policies, overseeing the implementation of the municipal solid waste management program, and submitting annual reports to the Sangguniang Bayan.

SECTION 6. SEGREGATION AND COLLECTION SYSTEM

1. Segregation at Source

All households, establishments, and institutions shall segregate waste at source into the following categories:

- Biodegradable Waste
- Non-biodegradable Waste
- Special Waste (paints, thinners, electrical wastes, household batteries, used cooking oil, lead-acid batteries, spray canisters, lamps, bulbs, and other similar items)

2. Waste Responsibility and Receptacles

a. All waste shall remain in the premises of its generator — whether household, store, or business establishment — until the designated day of collection. No other person or entity shall be burdened with the obligation to keep such waste.

b. All households, business establishments, and institutions are required to provide suitable trash receptacles (bins with color-coded covers – household bins are exempted for the color-coding), within their premises to properly contain their waste.

c. On the scheduled collection day, waste may be placed immediately outside or beside the property boundary or fence of the generator, provided that it is properly packed and securely tied to prevent scattering, leakage, or spillage.

d. The colors listed below are designated to represent the following waste categories:

- Red – Non-biodegradable
- Yellow – Special Waste

3. Proper Waste Packing and Set-Out

- All waste shall be stored and set out for collection in a closed plastic bag or other appropriate container to prevent the entry of insects, pests, and vermin, as well as the escape of foul odor and leachate.
- For households, all waste shall be placed in closed containers (i.e plastic bags, sacks, carton boxes and other similar containers), provided that biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes are properly segregated prior to collection. Where applicable, households are encouraged to use bio-bags for biodegradable wastes and regular plastic bags for non-biodegradable wastes.
- For business establishments, institutions, and commercial operators, strict segregation at source shall be observed using separate, clearly labeled color-coded containers or receptacles for biodegradable, non-biodegradable, and special wastes, in accordance with Republic Act No. 9003 and this Ordinance.
- Wastes generated from the wet market, slaughterhouse, and similar facilities shall be collected and stored in buckets or other durable, washable containers that prevent leakage, odor, and contamination. Such containers shall be kept covered at all times and handled separately from regular household or commercial waste to avoid health and sanitation risks.
- Waste that is unpacked, improperly packed, or spilled due to careless handling shall not be collected. In such cases, the generator or owner of the waste shall be responsible for immediately sweeping, cleaning, repacking, and restoring the area to sanitary condition before the next collection schedule.
- Waste shall be set out for collection only on the scheduled date and time designated by the Municipality via MEETO.
- Households, commercial establishments, and institutions shall set out their waste conspicuously only in front of their premises during the designated collection time.
- Bulky waste such as furniture, appliances, large branches, construction debris, and similar items shall not be collected during regular collection schedules, as these materials may cause damage to the municipal garbage truck compactor and other collection equipment.

Such wastes shall be subject to special collection arrangements, which must be coordinated in advance with the MEETO or the Municipal Treasurer's Office, and shall be subject to the prescribed special collection fee under the Revenue Code or a separate SWM Service Fees Ordinance.

i. The burning of wastes at source is strictly prohibited, whether in households, establishments, institutions, or open spaces, in full compliance with the provisions of Republic Act No. 8749 (Philippine Clean Air Act of 1999).

4. Special and Sharp Waste

Special wastes shall be placed in a separate, appropriate container and shall be disposed of in accordance with Republic Act No. 6969 (Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990) and its implementing guidelines. Broken glass, lamps, and other sharp objects shall be securely wrapped or enclosed in rigid materials such as hard cardboard or similar protective covering, tightly tied, to prevent injury to waste handlers and damage to collection bags or containers.

5. Wastes Generated from Ships, Vessels, and Port Operations

- a. Solid waste generated by ships, vessels, or port-based activities shall not be disposed of directly into the sea, port, or coastal waters of the Municipality.
- b. All vessels docking or operating within Palompon Port or any municipal anchorage area shall ensure that all shipboard wastes are properly segregated and stored in leak-proof containers while on board.
- c. Such wastes shall be turned over only to the designated port waste reception facility or to an LGU-accredited waste collector duly authorized by the MEETO, in accordance with standards prescribed by the Philippine Ports Authority (PPA), the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG), and the International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships (MARPOL).
- d. The Master, Ship Agent, or Vessel Owner/Operator shall be held responsible for ensuring compliance with this provision, including the payment of any applicable fees prescribed in the Municipal Revenue Code or a separate Revenue Ordinance.


6. Barangay Responsibilities


Barangays are not mainly responsible for the actual collection of wastes. Instead, they shall:

- a. Ensure that households, institutions, and establishments within their jurisdiction comply with segregation, storage, and disposal requirements as mandated by this Ordinance;
- b. Establish and maintain a Barangay Materials Recovery Facility (MRF), or participate in a cluster MRF, for the sorting, composting, and storage of biodegradable and recyclable wastes prior to transfer to higher-level facilities;
- c. Make announcement if there are any unannounced changes in the scheduled collection of garbage.



- d. Conduct regular monitoring and enforcement within their jurisdiction, issuing Barangay Citation Tickets for violators;
- e. Undertake information and education campaigns (IEC) on proper waste management in coordination with the MEETO;
- f. Submit quarterly compliance and monitoring reports to the Municipal Environment and Eco-Tourism Office (MEETO).

7. Municipal Responsibilities

The Municipality, through the MEETO, shall:

- a. Collect garbage wastes on a scheduled basis across the Municipality of Palompon.
- b. The MEETO shall ensure strict implementation of eco-tourism waste management policies, particularly in Kalanggaman Island and other Tourism Destination Areas.
- c. Ensure that all collected wastes are first delivered to the Centralized Materials Recovery Facility (CMRF) for proper sorting and segregation of recyclable materials, glass bottles, and biodegradable wastes, prior to final disposal or processing of residual wastes at an engineered sanitary landfill or other DENR-accredited disposal facility;
- d. Provide logistical and technical support to barangays for the establishment and operation of MRFs;
- e. Coordinate with accredited waste transporters, recyclers, and final disposal facilities to ensure lawful and sustainable waste handling.

8. Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR)

For the effective implementation of this Section, the MEETO shall prepare and issue the corresponding Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR), which shall include, among others, the detailed schedule of collection for the several types of garbage covering the entire Municipality of Palompon, as well as operational guidelines for barangays, households, and Commercial establishments.

SECTION 7. SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT

1. General Provisions

The Municipality of Palompon, in line with Republic Act No. 9003 (Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000), shall implement a comprehensive and sustainable solid waste management program that prioritizes waste reduction, segregation, recycling, composting, and environmentally sound final disposal.

a. The MEETO shall oversee the implementation of waste management programs in all tourism destinations within Palompon.

b. MEETO shall formulate and implement special guidelines for waste segregation, collection, transport, and disposal specifically tailored for tourism activities.

c. MEETO shall designate tourism waste coordinators for high-volume tourist destinations such as Kalanggaman Island.

3. Responsibilities of Tourism Operators and Transport Providers

a. Pumpboat operators, tour organizers, and resort owners shall provide color-coded trash bags to tourists for proper segregation of waste into biodegradable, non-biodegradable, and special wastes.

b. All wastes generated by tourists must be brought back to the mainland and turned over to the designated waste collection system of the Municipality.

c. Tourism operators shall brief tourists on waste management guidelines prior to departure to Kalanggaman Island and other tourism sites.

4. Responsibilities of Tourists

a. Tourists are required to comply with the waste segregation guidelines and to dispose of their waste only in designated receptacles or color-coded trash bags provided by their tour operators.

b. Littering, dumping, or leaving waste in beaches, islands, or tourism facilities is strictly prohibited.

5. Responsibilities of Island Concessionaires and Tour Operators with Catering Services

Island concessionaires, vendors, and businesses operating within Kalanggaman Island and other Municipal Tourism Destination Areas, as well as tour packages that include food or catering services, shall:

a. Provide and maintain suitable trash receptacles within the immediate vicinity of their concession or catering area, clearly labeled for biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes.

b. Ensure that all wastes generated by their operations, services, and customers are properly segregated, packed, and turned over to the designated collection point or tourism waste coordinator.

c. Be responsible for bringing back all wastes generated by their operations to the mainland, where it shall be surrendered to the municipal collection system for proper sorting, recovery, and disposal.

d. Prohibit littering within their area of operation and maintain cleanliness at all times.

C. For Tourism Related Activities

The penalties for the Tourism Destination Areas (TDA's) tourist violators and guides (including pumpboat operators, travel agencies and etc.) for littering and not segregating their garbage are the following:

 - iii. Third and Subsequent Offense - A fine of Two Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (Php 2,500.00) and revocation of permit, to operate tourism transport services in Palompon.
2. Any Tourist Destination Area Concessionaires violating any of the provisions shall be penalized with the following:
 - i. First Offense - A fine of One Thousand Pesos (Php 1,000.00) and Reprimand through Citation Ticket.
 - ii. Second Offense - A fine of Two Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (Php 2,500.00) and temporary suspension of operation & business permit until compliance is certified by the MEETO.
 - iii. Third and Subsequent Offense - A fine of Two Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (Php 2,500.00) and revocation of business permit, without prejudice to criminal prosecution under this Ordinance.

3. Any tourist found violating this Ordinance shall be subject to:

- i. First Offense - A fine of Five Hundred Pesos (Php 500.00).
- ii. Second Offense - A fine of One Thousand Pesos (Php 1,000.00).
- iii. Third Offense - A fine of Two Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (Php 2,500.00) and banning of the tourist from the TDA's of Palompon for one (1) year

D. For Ships, Vessels, Port-Based Waste Generators, and Accredited Waste Collectors

1. Ships, Vessels, and Port-Based Waste Generators

Any ship, vessel, or marine craft found violating the provisions of this Ordinance — including but not limited to illegal dumping, failure to segregate, improper waste disposal, or non-compliance with waste reception procedures — shall be subject to appropriate penalties as prescribed by the Philippine Ports Authority (PPA), the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG), and the International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships (MARPOL), without prejudice to the imposition of administrative sanctions by the Municipality of Palompon, such as:

- a. Refusal of entry or docking clearance
- b. Temporary suspension of port access or waste disposal privileges
- c. Revocation of local accreditation or denial of waste reception service
- d. Reporting of the violation to the PPA and PCG for further administrative and criminal action under applicable maritime and environmental laws

Any vessel or operator found non-compliant may also be required to pay for the actual cost of cleanup, waste handling, or environmental rehabilitation, as determined by the MEETO in coordination with the PPA and PCG.

Failure to comply with the imposed penalties or payment of fines within fifteen (15) days from issuance shall subject the vessel, ship agent, or owner/operator to surcharge, legal action, and reporting to the PPA and PCG for further administrative sanctions.

2. Accredited Waste Collectors

Any accredited waste collector, cooperative, or private entity found violating the provisions of this Ordinance or the terms of accreditation shall be penalized as follows:

- i. First Offense - Reprimand through Citation Ticket and mandatory corrective action within a prescribed period determined by MEETO.

Failure to comply with the payment of fines or penalties within fifteen (15) days from issuance shall result in automatic suspension of accreditation until compliance is made, subject to further administrative or legal action by the MEETO.

E. For Government and Non-government Institutions

The penalties for Government and Non-government Institutions for littering, not segregating their garbage and violating any of the provisions shall be penalized with the following:

- 1. First Offense - Reprimand through Citation Ticket
- 2. Second Offense - A fine of Two Thousand Pesos (Php 2,000.00), Community Service or final warning for revocation of Business Permit.
- 3. Third and Subsequent Offense - A fine of Two Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (Php 2,500.00) and Filing of Administrative and/or Criminal Charges as mandated in R.A. 9003 of the Philippine Constitution known as the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000.

F. Continuing Offense

Each day that a violation continues shall be deemed a separate and distinct offense, subject to the same schedule of fines and penalties.

G. Non-Compliance with Penalties

Failure to comply with or settle the penalties described in this Ordinance within fifteen (15) days from notice of violation shall authorize the Municipality of Palompon, through the Municipal Legal Office and the MEETO, to initiate appropriate legal actions or judicial proceedings against the violator, without prejudice to the imposition of additional fines, surcharges, or sanctions as may be allowed under law.

H. Special Provision for Business Establishments

In addition to the penalties herein provided, any business establishment that fails to pay, settle, or comply with the penalties within fifteen (15) days from notice may be subject to cancellation or non-renewal of its business permit or license, upon the recommendation of the MEETO and the Municipal Treasurer, and after due process in accordance with existing laws and regulations.

I. Barangay-Level Enforcement

1. Barangays shall serve as the first line of enforcement of this Ordinance, pursuant to RA 7160, Section 389(b)(9), which mandates the Punong Barangay to enforce laws and municipal ordinances.
2. Barangay officials and duly designated barangay tanods are authorized to apprehend violators and issue Barangay Citation Tickets for first-time offenses.
3. Offenders apprehended by barangays shall settle their fines only with the Municipal Treasurer's Office or its duly authorized collecting officer. Barangays are not authorized to directly collect monetary penalties under this Ordinance.
4. Barangays shall monitor compliance, endorse reports, and assist in ensuring that violators who fail to settle their penalties within the prescribed period are referred to the Municipal Government for appropriate legal action.
5. Repeat violators or uncooperative establishments shall be endorsed to the Municipal Government for the imposition of higher penalties, including possible suspension, cancellation, or non-renewal of business permits and appropriate legal action.

SECTION 12. GARBAGE COLLECTION FEES

1. Authority to Collect Fees

The Municipality of Palompon, through the Municipal Treasurer's Office, shall collect garbage collection fees to cover the cost of waste collection, transport, and disposal services, subject to RA 7160 and RA 9003.

2. Imposition of Fees

The schedule of fees, rates, and charges shall be fixed and updated through a separate Revenue Ordinance or the Municipal Revenue Code, provided that no service shall be rendered without corresponding payment of the prescribed fee.

3. Barangay Contribution from Local Funds

All Barangays within the Municipality of Palompon are mandated to allocate an annual amount of Two Thousand Pesos (₱2,000.00) from their respective barangay budgets as their institutional contribution to the Municipal Solid Waste Management Program, remitted not later than the first quarter of each year. Barangays shall include this amount under their Annual Appropriation Ordinance.

4. Mode of Payment

Failure to pay prescribed fees within the period provided shall subject the violator to surcharges and penalties, including possible suspension or revocation of business permits, as may be detailed in the Revenue Ordinance."

SECTION 13. ACCEPTANCE OF EXTERNAL SOLID WASTES GENERATED OUTSIDE THE TERRITORIAL JURISDICTION OF PALOMPON

1. Policy on External Waste Disposal

The Municipality of Palompon may accept solid wastes generated by persons, establishments, institutions, or local government units outside its territorial jurisdiction, subject to the capacity of its waste management facilities and in compliance with DENR and NSWMC guidelines. Acceptance shall be covered by a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA).

2. Acceptance and Tipping Fees

- a. All external solid wastes shall only be accepted upon payment of fees prescribed by the Sangguniang Bayan.
- b. Fees shall include an acceptance fee (for administrative and facility use costs) and a tipping fee (based on tonnage/volume of wastes delivered for disposal).
- c. Rates shall be provided in a separate revenue ordinance or the Municipal Revenue Code to allow for periodic adjustment.

3. Conditions for Acceptance

- a. Only non-biodegradable domestic waste shall be accepted.
- b. Toxic and hazardous wastes shall not be accepted, except when their acceptance, handling, treatment, and disposal strictly conform with the provisions of Republic Act No. 6969 (Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990), its Implementing Rules and Regulations, and any duly enacted Toxic and Hazardous Waste Ordinance of the Municipality of Palompon, as applicable.
- c. Deliveries must be coordinated with the MEETO at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to acceptance.
- d. The Municipality reserves the right to refuse acceptance when wastes do not meet requirements or when facility capacity is already at critical levels.

4. Use of Proceeds

All fees collected under this Section shall accrue to the Municipal Budget of this Local Government Unit subject to the usual accounting and auditing rules and regulations.

SECTION 14. APPROPRIATIONS

The Municipality shall allocate funds under its annual budget for the effective implementation of this Ordinance, including IEC campaigns, equipment, and operational support for barangays. Revenues collected from penalties shall accrue to the Municipal Budget of this Local Government Unit subject to the usual accounting and auditing rules and regulations.

SECTION 15. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE

If any provision of this Ordinance is declared invalid, the remaining provisions shall not be affected.

SECTION 16. REPEALING CLAUSE

All ordinances or portions thereof inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

SECTION 17. EFFECTIVITY

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its approval and after compliance with the posting and publication requirements prescribed under Section 59 of R.A. 7160.







MINUTES OF THE PUBLIC HEARING HELD ON OCTOBER 16, 2025 AT THE NGCPC HALL OF THIS MUNICIPALITY CONDUCTED BY THE COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

With the presence of the Municipal Environment and Eco-Tourism Office (MEETO), Municipal Council for Culture, Arts, and Tourism, Business Permit and Licensing Office, thirty-nine (39) Punong Barangays, Business Sectors, Educational Institutions, Private Sectors, Civil Society Organizations, and other stakeholders, the public hearing was called to order at exactly 9:30 A.M. and commenced with an opening prayer led by Mr. Dario Raymundo, followed by the singing of the National Anthem and Palompon Hymn by the sound system.

The Municipal Vice Mayor, Hon. Javes Keith R. de la Calzada, opened the public hearing by expressing his gratitude to all the visitors and participants who took the time to attend. He then gave an overview and a brief insight into the purpose and scope of the discussion, emphasizing the importance of strengthening Palompon's environmental programs through proper and sustainable solid waste management.


The hearing was presided over by Vice Mayor de la Calzada, the Overall Presiding Officer of the Sangguniang Bayan, in coordination with the Committee on Environmental Protection together with the participation of other concerned committees of the Sangguniang Bayan. The following proposed municipal ordinances were introduced for public presentation and consultation:

1. "An Ordinance Providing for the Comprehensive Solid Waste Management System of the Municipality of Palompon, Leyte, Prescribing Policies, Measures, Institutional Mechanisms, Regulation Including the Waste Management for Tourism and Port Operations, and Providing Penalties for Violations Thereof, and for Other Purposes"; and
2. "An Ordinance Prescribing the Schedule of Fees and Charges for Solid Waste Management Services in the Municipality of Palompon, Leyte, and for Other Purposes."

The proposed measures were presented by representatives from the Municipal Environment and Eco-Tourism Office (MEETO). The presentation discussed the intent, implications, and objectives of the proposed ordinances and how these align with existing national and international environmental laws and conventions. The Committee recognized that the enactment of these ordinances is in full compliance with the following: Republic Act No. 9003, otherwise known as the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000; Republic Act No. 6969, otherwise known as the Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990; Republic Act No. 9593, otherwise known as the Tourism Act of 2009; the International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships (MARPOL); and Republic Act No. 11898, or the Extended Producer Responsibility

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- Act of 2022, which mandates large enterprises to establish and implement programs that reduce plastic waste and ensure environmental accountability throughout their product life cycle.

During the open forum, the following issues, concerns, and suggestions were raised and duly addressed:

1. Ms. Virginia Beltran raised three points:

- First, under Section 8, Number 5 (Responsibilities of Island Concessionaires and Tour Operators with Catering Services), letter (e), which states: "Adopt waste reduction practices, including the discouragement of the use of styrofoam." She suggested that the provision should also discourage the use of single-use plastics.
- Second, she inquired about solid wastes along the shoreline and comfort rooms discharging directly into the sea.
- Third, she raised a concern regarding animals, particularly dogs, defecating indiscriminately along roads, and how such acts may be regulated.

Vice Mayor de la Calzada responded that the first suggestion already includes the discouragement of single-use and non-reusable materials, while the second and third issues fall under separate ordinances addressing sanitation and animal control.

2. Mr. Rane Gonzaga, a market vendor, suggested that the Municipality should totally ban the use of plastic.

Vice Mayor de la Calzada explained that the Municipality already observes a "No Plastic Day" every Tuesday, as part of its environmental program.

Mr. Raoul Bacalla, MEETO Specialist, added that the Municipality is implementing environmental measures gradually, to observe their impact before full enforcement.

3. Mr. Jonrey Poblete, representative from DES Yamaha, asked if their establishment may deliver their wastes directly to the Sanitary Landfill.

Mr. Raoul Bacalla advised them to heads up to the MEETO for proper and legal process regarding waste disposal.

4. Ms. Jennilyn Singson, representative from Jollibee Palompon, requested that their food wastes be collected daily instead of once a week, as they tend to emit foul odor and attract worms when stored for several days.


Vice Mayor de la Calzada likewise advised her to heads up to the MEETO for proper and legal process, particularly regarding special collection arrangements.

5. Ms. Rosario Valenzona, Chairman of PACCI and PALTRANSCO, suggested that the ordinance should clearly define and distinguish biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes to avoid confusion in waste segregation.

Before closing the forum, Vice Mayor de la Calzada reminded all Punong Barangays to maintain and ensure the functionality of their respective Materials Recovery Facilities (MRFs) in compliance with Republic Act No. 9003, otherwise known as the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000.

After thorough discussions and careful evaluation, the Committee finds the proposed ordinances essential in establishing comprehensive and sustainable guidelines for the proper management of solid waste within the Municipality of Palompon. These measures aim to strengthen environmental protection, promote responsible waste segregation and disposal, enhance sanitation practices in both residential and commercial areas, and support the municipality's continuing efforts toward sustainable tourism and eco-friendly development.

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
