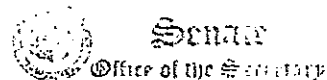


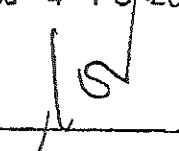

AN ACT
ESTABLISHING A TECHNOLOGY-ENABLED PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE
MONITORING SYSTEM (PIMS) FOR PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS,
REQUIRING THE SUBMISSION OF PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION DATA AND
TIMELAPSE DOCUMENTATION, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Recent public scrutiny over anomalous government flood control projects has highlighted the need for greater transparency and accountability in the implementation of public infrastructure. Filipinos deserve to know whether roads, schools, hospitals, flood control structures, and other public works are delivered on time and according to plan.

Today, monitoring infrastructure projects still relies largely on periodic reports and physical inspections, making it difficult to provide timely and reliable information on project progress. However, advances in technology now make it possible to modernize this process.

This bill institutionalizes a Public Infrastructure Monitoring System (PIMS) for all government-funded public infrastructure projects. It requires contractors to upload timelapse videos documenting project progress, while requiring implementing agencies to maintain updated project dashboards containing key project information. By harnessing technology to improve transparency, accountability, and oversight, this measure seeks to reduce delays, deter irregularities, and help ensure that public infrastructure is delivered efficiently and effectively for the benefit of every Filipino.

In view of the foregoing, the passage of this bill is earnestly sought.

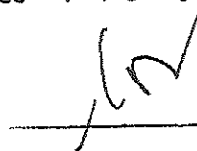

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AN ACT
ESTABLISHING A TECHNOLOGY-ENABLED PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE
MONITORING SYSTEM (PIMS) FOR PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS,
REQUIRING THE SUBMISSION OF PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION DATA AND
TIMELAPSE DOCUMENTATION, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1 Section 1. *Short Title.* – This Act shall be known as the "Public Infrastructure
2 Monitoring System (PIMS) Act."

3 Sec. 2. *Declaration of Policy.* – The State recognizes that real-time and
4 continuous visual documentation of construction activities is essential to ensuring that
5 public funds are spent efficiently, contractors fulfill their contractual obligations, and
6 infrastructure projects are completed in accordance with approved plans,
7 specifications, and timelines. It is hereby declared the policy of the State to promote
8 transparency, accountability, efficiency, and public participation in the implementation
9 of government-funded public infrastructure projects through the use of digital
10 technologies for real-time monitoring and reporting.

11 Sec. 3. *Definition of Terms.* – As used in this Act:

12 (a) *Contractor* refers to any person, partnership, corporation, joint venture,
13 cooperative, association, or other juridical entity duly licensed under Republic Act No.
14 4566, or the Contractors' License Law, as amended, that undertakes, contracts, or is
15 engaged by a government agency to implement, construct, repair, improve,
16 rehabilitate, maintain, or complete a public infrastructure project;

1 (b) *Implementing Agency* refers to any national government agency,
2 government-owned or controlled corporation (GOCC), state university or college
3 (SUC), local government unit (LGU), or other government entity responsible for
4 implementing a public infrastructure project funded wholly or partially from public
5 funds;

6 (c) *Public Infrastructure Project* refers to any construction, rehabilitation,
7 improvement, repair, or maintenance project involving roads, bridges, buildings, flood
8 control systems, water supply systems, seaports, airports, and other physical
9 infrastructure funded wholly or partially from public funds;

10 (d) *Public Funds* refers to all moneys collected or received by the government,
11 including national funds, local government funds, Official Development Assistance
12 (ODA) funds, and any other funds managed by or on behalf of any government entity;

13 (e) *Public Infrastructure Monitoring System (PIMS)* refers to the government
14 digital platform used for monitoring and reporting the progress of public infrastructure
15 projects;

16 (f) *Timelapse Video* refers to a video recording produced by capturing images
17 at a set interval over a period of time and then played back at a higher speed, resulting
18 in a compressed visual record of construction activities occurring at a project site;

19 (g) *Project Site* refers to the physical location where a public infrastructure
20 project is being implemented; and

21 (h) *Geotagged Data* refers to electronic data associated with a specific
22 geographic location through coordinates, location identifiers, or similar technologies
23 capable of identifying the physical location of a project site.

24 Sec. 4. *Scope and Coverage.* – This Act shall apply to all public infrastructure
25 projects funded wholly or partially from public funds and covered by contracts entered
26 into after the effectivity of this Act.

1 *Sec. 5. Establishment of the Public Infrastructure Monitoring System (PIMS. –*

2 The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), in coordination with the
3 Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) shall hereby
4 establish and administer a Public Infrastructure Monitoring System, or PIMS, which
5 shall serve as a real-time digital platform for the monitoring and reporting of
6 government public infrastructure projects.

7 All public infrastructure projects covered by this Act shall be integrated into the
8 PIMS. The contractor for each project shall be required to upload timelapse videos
9 under Section 6 of this Act, and to submit timely and accurate implementation data,
10 progress reports, and such other information as may be required for the effective
11 operation of the PIMS.

12 *Sec. 6. Project Dashboard. -* Each implementing agency shall maintain and
13 regularly update a PIMS Project Dashboard for every covered public infrastructure
14 project under its jurisdiction. The dashboard shall contain, at a minimum, the following
15 information:

16 (a) Project title and description;

17 (b) Implementing agency;

18 (c) Name of contractor and major subcontractors, where applicable;

19 (d) Contract amount;

20 (e) Funding source;

21 (f) Contract duration and target completion date;

22 (g) Notice to Proceed date;

23 (h) Percentage of physical accomplishment;

24 (i) Timelapse videos and related progress documentation;

25 (j) Implementation status; and

(k) Such other information as may be necessary to promote transparency and accountability.

The PIMS Project Dashboard shall be publicly accessible through an online portal.

Sec. 7. Mandatory Timelapse Video Upload Requirement. – All contractors covered under Section 4 of this Act shall be required to:

(a) Install and maintain at least one (1) timelapse camera at each project site, positioned to capture a comprehensive view of the ongoing construction activities. For large-scale projects involving multiple construction fronts, the implementing agency may require the installation of additional cameras;

(b) Upload timelapse videos of construction progress to the PIMS at least once every two (2) weeks, or at such intervals as may be prescribed in the project's Contract and applicable implementing rules and regulations, from the commencement of construction until the issuance of the Certificate of Completion and Final Acceptance by the government;

(c) Ensure that timelapse videos uploaded to the PIMS clearly capture construction activities, are time-stamped, geotagged, and are of sufficient clarity and resolution to allow effective monitoring of project progress and verification of project conditions;

(d) Maintain physical storage or cloud backup of all timelapse footage for a period of at least ten (10) years from the date of final acceptance of the project, and make such footage available to authorized government agencies and oversight bodies upon request; and

(e) Submit a written certification, signed by the contractor's authorized representative and the project engineer, accompanying each timelapse video upload, attesting that the uploaded footage is authentic, unaltered, and accurately represents the actual state of the project at the time of recording.

1 Sec. 8. *PIMS Standards.* – The DPWH, in coordination with the DICT, shall
2 ensure that the PIMS is capable of:

3 (a) Receiving, storing, and organizing timelapse video uploads from contractors
4 nationwide;

5 (b) Providing public access to all timelapse video uploads, subject to reasonable
6 limitations on bandwidth and data protection;

7 (c) Generating automated alerts to concerned government agencies when
8 contractors fail to comply with required upload schedules;

9 (d) Integrating timelapse video data with other project monitoring metrics such
10 as financial disbursements, inspection reports, and project milestones;

11 (e) Maintaining an audit trail of all uploads, modifications, and access to
12 uploaded materials; and

13 (f) Generating dashboard summaries and project status reports for public
14 viewing.

15 The DPWH and the DICT shall ensure that the PIMS is integrated and
16 interoperable with existing and future government digital platforms to promote
17 transparency, accountability, and effective monitoring of public infrastructure projects
18 and the utilization of public funds.

19 Sec. 9. *Responsibilities of the Implementing Agency.* – The implementing
20 agency shall:

21 (a) Include the timelapse video upload requirement as a standard provision in
22 all contracts for covered public infrastructure projects;

23 (b) Ensure the timely and accurate updating of the PIMS Project Dashboard for
24 projects under its jurisdiction;

25 (c) Monitor contractor compliance with the timelapse upload requirement and
26 incorporate such compliance into project monitoring reports;

(d) Include compliance with the timelapse upload requirement as a condition for the processing and release of progress billings; and

(e) Ensure that no progress billing shall be processed unless the contractor is compliant with all applicable timelapse upload requirements.

Sec. 10. *Prohibited Acts.* – The following acts are prohibited under this Act:

(a) Failure or refusal to submit or upload the implementation data, progress reports, timelapse videos, or other information required under this Act;

(b) Uploading of altered, edited, fabricated, or misrepresented timelapse videos;

(c) Deliberate obstruction, tampering, or destruction of timelapse recording equipment;

(d) Submission of false certification;

(e) Unauthorized access to, deletion of, or tampering with timelapse videos stored in the PIMS.

SEC. 11. *Penalties.* – Any person who willfully commits any of the prohibited acts under Section 10 involving fraud, falsification, deliberate tampering, or other intentional misconduct shall, upon conviction, be punished with a fine of up to Three Million Pesos (P3,000,000.00), without prejudice to suspension or blacklisting under existing procurement laws and any applicable civil or criminal liability under existing laws.

If the offender is a juridical entity, the responsible officers who authorized or knowingly participated in the commission of the violation shall be held liable.

Public officials found liable for willfully violating this Act shall, in addition to the applicable penalties under this Act, be subject to the appropriate administrative, civil, and criminal sanctions under existing laws.

1 Sec. 12. *Evidentiary Value.* – Timelapse videos, raw footage, certifications,
2 upload logs, metadata, audit trails, and other electronic records generated,
3 maintained, or stored within the PIMS shall be admissible as electronic evidence in
4 accordance with the Rules on Electronic Evidence and other applicable laws.

5 Sec. 13. *Implementing Rules and Regulations.* – Rules and regulations
6 necessary for the effective enforcement of the provisions of this Act shall be
7 formulated by the DPWH, in coordination with the DICT and the Department of Interior
8 and Local Government (DILG), and shall be implemented within ninety (90) days from
9 the effectivity of this Act.

10 Sec. 14. *Appropriations.* – The amount necessary to implement the provisions
11 of this Act shall be charged against the current year's appropriations of the DPWH.
12 Thereafter, such amounts as may be necessary for the continued implementation of
13 this Act shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act (GAA).

14 Sec. 15. *Separability Clause.* – If any provision of this Act is held invalid or
15 unconstitutional, the other provisions not so declared shall remain in force and effect.

16 Sec. 16. *Repealing Clause.* – All laws, decrees, orders and rules and regulations
17 contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or
18 amended accordingly.

19 Sec. 17. *Effectivity.* – Notwithstanding the non-issuance of the implementing
20 rules and regulations, this Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in
21 the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation.

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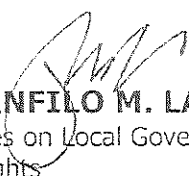
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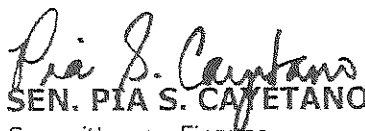

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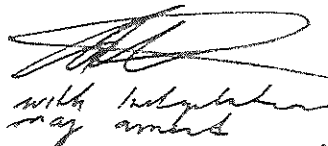
